Our hand is 13 HCP . We can't count shortness
yet, because we do not have a fit with partner. We have 6 losers ( $\mathbf{2}$ each in $\boldsymbol{\Delta}, \boldsymbol{\otimes}$, \& $\boldsymbol{\&}$ ). Our options are: Pass, 2 $\boldsymbol{a}$, 2v, 3४.

We can dismiss both 2as and $3 \checkmark$ immediately - these bids show much stronger hands (by an Ace minimum) than we have here. 37 promises $6+$ cards, too.

That leaves us with Pass and 2ヶ. Pass is consistent with 13 HCP. Double would show a hand like: A1073 YAKQ86 10 J106, not too much different from our hand.

So the question becomes how aggressive do we want to be? We are vulnerable, they are not. This suggest we not stretch much. Double is aggressive, pass is not.

Vulnerable, bidding further is extremely risky. This is a clear pass.

3* making 4 was top board for North. What happened?

EW were too conservative!!


A Double of 2 would have worked better than Pass. This would have emboldened East to bid 4 .

Likewise a 2a bid in place of the delayed $2 \vee$ raise by East would embolden West. 2a on a weak hand workd because East has 7 Support Points for West and can return to $\downarrow$ with relative safety. Making 4 requires picking up the suit for no loss. There is insufficient information in the bidding to know whether to play North or South for the singleton Honor. We don't try to get to games like these. Instead we should be happy to get to $3 \vee$ or 3@. Both East and West had opportunities to better describe the playing strength based on their distribution.

This week we look at one of the advantages of $2 / 1$ bidding for reaching slam. Enjoy.


Here $3 \boldsymbol{V}$ cannot be invitational to game since in $2 / 1$ we are already committed to game. If North had a minimum they could go immediately to $4 \downarrow$, so $3 \vee$ is actually showing extra values and interest in slam. In hearts South has at least 17 support points ( 14 HCP plus 3 for the void) and strong slam interest. They can cue bid first round control above $3 \mathbf{v}$; in this case bidding 34 showing the A and eventually bid 4NT (Blackwood or Roman Keycard) to ask for keycards given the strength of their hand. One way or the other they should arrive at 6 \%.
Play of the Hand - Declarer (South) has 3 club losers but one can go on the $\downarrow A$ and another can be ruffed to make $6 \vee$ or 1430. Make sure to give up a club and ruff one before drawing

## Board 15 (Tuesday 2/11)

Standard American Bidding - South has 14 HCP, 5 spades and will open 14. North has support for spades and 17 support points ( 16 HCP plus one for the doubleton). North knows they need to get to at least game but will need something extra from partner to reach slam ( $32+$ support points). North first bid should be $2 \downarrow$ looking to raise spades later. South is not excited about partner bidding into their void and will rebid $2 \checkmark$ hoping to find a fit there. North has 4 hearts and likes their hand but will likely settle for game in $4 \vee$ playing a $4-4$ fit versus a $5-3$ fit. North should not bid $3 \vee$ which is invitational to game and can be passed. After $4 \vee$ by North, South with a void in partner's first bid suit and no idea there is a spade fit too will pass.
2/1 Bidding - South still opens 14 and North bids $2 \downarrow$. The difference is that this sequence is game forcing in $2 / 1$ bidding so North-South can bid out their shape and look for slam without fear of being passed short of game. South will rebid $2 \vee$ as before but North can respond $3 \vee$. all the trump or you will not make your contract.
Post Mortem - One of the strengths of $2 / 1$ bidding is the ability to explore for slam short of game as in this example.
