On Minorwood by Steve Moese Tue 3/4

We had a great discussion about a hand from Monday night where Minorwood would help define whether slam in a minor (As) is a good bet. Using 4N as the only bid to ask partner for key cards has limitations that become more severe as the trump strain goes from \bigstar to \forall to \blacklozenge to \clubsuit . When \forall are trumps and partner responds 5 (Showing either 0-3 or 1-4 keycards depending on your agreement), you no longer have a Trump Queen ask below the level of 5. **NO SAFETY.** In the other extreme if our suit is **&** and we want to ask for key cards, we must be able to play



in slam if partner responds 5 or higher! The useful space for exploration dwindles to nothing as we go down in rank for the trump suit. Jeff Rubens recognized this and published extensively, forever changing how experts investigate slams. The hand (Board 32) is reproduced approximately as hand records are not posted for Monday's game.

Bidding: North deals and opens 14. South responds 1♠ (not 1♦. Responder's

Reverse should show 4=5+ pattern not 4-4). Here's how experts might bid this hand:

North's hand is distributional but not strong enough to rebid 3♣. 2♦ is an artificial force (and precedes GF bids by responder - Google "Third Suit Forcing" for more details). 27 is either a concentration of strength or a 4-card suit. 3♣ forces game and allows spade for slam exploration. 3♦ shows any of ♦ A or K, or $0/1 \blacklozenge$ - all of these are 1^{st} or 2^{nd} round controls. With ♣ agreed as trumps, 4♣ by responder is Minorwood, asking for 1430 key cards. One cute wrinkle that saves auction

space: when partner asks for the Trump Queen, use the nearest NT bid to say YES and show the K of the strain partner asked in (here ♥s). Playing SAYC (with minorwood), the auction might be simpler: 1&-P-1&-P-2&-P-4& and on to 6& as above. Note the simpler auction doesn't show s as superior to No Trump.

This week we look at a hand ideal for a sacrifice.

Bidding – East with 11 HCP and 5-5 in the majors is likely to open 1. South has 13 HCP and 5-5 in the minor suits. Many will bid Unusual 2NT with this hand showing 5-5 or more in the minors. Point ranges for unusual 2NT can vary. Most play it shows either less than (5-11 HCP) or more than opening strength (16+

HCP). With an opening strength hand you can bid your suits directly. While this hand has 13 HCP, 4 are in a singleton spade making a less than opening 2NT call worth considering. West has 15 support point for spades (10 HCP, 3 for the void and 2 more for extra spades). Over a 2NT call many will bid directly to 4♠. North with 6 clubs and 4 diamonds knows E-W likely has game. On even vulnerability, North can afford to go down 2 doubled and should bid 5♣.

Most East-Wests will compete to 5 on this wildly distributional deal.

Play of the Hand – On most leads against 5♠ North-South will take 2 spades and 1 diamond to set the contract.

Post Mortem – When opponents are likely to make game, sacrificing makes sense. On even vulnerability, you can afford to go down 2. When you are not vulnerable and

opponents are you can afford to go down 3. Be careful when you are vulnerable and opponents are not. In these situations you can only afford to go down doubled.
