

### A Delicate Bid by Steve Moese Tue 3/18



Here's an interesting hand where both sides have chances to make 9 tricks! If you bid to 3♠ as NS you will win many Match Points. EW can steal the board by bidding a delicate 3N. Here's one way. Not everyone will open the West hand 1♥. The arguments against are

11 HCP and flat 3532 shape. The arguments for are 2 Quick Tricks and great ♥ intermediate cards. This is the 2/1 auction we had last night. 2♣ is a game force

showing either natural ♣s (4+ cards) or any balanced game force (2+ ♣s. With 5++ we bid 2♦). 2♦ shows a suit or a concentration of (Stoppers) in a hand that doesn't want to rebid ♥ (implying 6 cards) or NT (implying stoppers

in the side suits). 3♣ reveals real ♣s. 3♥ says nothing left to bid and denies a ♠ stop. 3♠ is the delicate bid. Partner could have rebid 2♥ to show 3-card support earlier – s/he doesn't have ♥ support. S/he could have rebid 2N or 3N, so s/he doesn't have a full ♠ stopper (the unbid suit). What does 3♠ mean? When both partners have bypassed showing a NT stopper in a suit, the cue bid of that suit asks for a partial stopper. A partial stopper is any of Qxx, Q10x, Jxx, J10X, J9x - a holding that when combined with partner's honor creates a frozen suit and a stopper. A frozen suit means the side leading the suit 1st gives up a trick. Why bid 3N? South's Double asks for a ♠ lead. Knowing the ♠ suit is frozen, and trusting opponents will cooperate with each other, the 3N bid is a reasonable gamble. Sure enough, a ♠ lead gives EW

the 9<sup>th</sup> and game going trick. West was happy to have **★J42** and not **★J4!!!** A ♦ lead sets 3N! Try it to see why! EW 3N+3 got 5.5/6 MPs. NS 3♠+3 got 2.8/4 MPs.

Post Mortem - Opening the West hand 1♥ requires partnership discussion. Precision opens this 11 HCP hand routinely.

When partner makes a "strange" or delicate bid, assume partner is bidding logically. Trust is a major ingredient to success at bridge. Follow Sherlock Holmes' advice: "Eliminate all other factors, and the one which remains must be the truth" (Sir A. Conan Doyle, Sign of the Four).



This week we set our sight on slam. Enjoy!



#### (Tuesday 3/18)

Bidding – South has 22 HCP with 5 spades to the AKQJ10 and will open this hand 2♣ (21+ HCP any shape, 22+ if balanced). North has 11 HCP and should be thinking slam in a suit or NT. Most will bid 2♦ (Waiting, promising K or better values, Game Forcing). South can now show their spade suit by bidding 2♠. North is strong enough to immediately bid 4NT asking for key cards in spades (Roman Key Card or 1430 RKC). South's response is 5♠ (2 or 5 key cards

with the Q of trump). From the  $2\clubsuit$  open, North knows South has 5 key cards and with the remaining kings and a possible source of tricks in clubs can push for  $7\clubsuit$  or settle for  $6\spadesuit$ .

Play of the Hand – On a ♥10 lead (10 from Q109), South has 2 losers (2♥). Declarer can ruff one heart as

long as hearts break 4-3. They can also pitch one or two hearts by setting up a good clubs in dummy. Best play to make 7 will be to win the ♥A, draw two rounds of trump, and then cash two clubs. When the ♣Q falls on the second round of clubs we can comfortably ruff a third low club, draw the last trump and then run 2 more clubs pitching your heart losers for making 7♠ for 2210 or 1460 if you settled for small slam.

**Post Mortem** – Not often we ask for keycards and partner has all 5 plus the queen of trump. Getting to this slam is much easier when you play Roman Key Card (Regular or 1430). If you are using Blackwood you will not know about the ♠Q and will definitely settle for 6♠.
