

Finding the 10th

Trick by Steve Moese
While the NS hands total only 23 HCP, there's plenty of shape.
Aggressive bidders get to game. North has 8 HCP and 1 Shortness point (9 Support Points). South has 15 HCP and 2 length points + 2 shortness points (19 Support Points).

The Bidding – After 3 passes, South will open 1♠. North will make a singe raise to 2♠. Some

Souths will bid game directly. Others might invite by bidding $3 \pm$ (other game tries are available, too).

The Opening Lead - West will start with a red K. Assume the ♥K. This exposes 2 ♥ losers immediately.

The Plan – South counts 9 winners and 3 or 4 losers. Securing only 3 losers makes this thin game. When playing thin contracts, play to make before worrying about overtricks. Many won't bid your game!

How can we develop a 10^{th} trick? Ruffing 3 rounds of will work only if one opponent holds ACQx exactly – not a very good chance. Yes, the $4^{th} \neq$ might be good, but that requires a 3-3 break in that suit. 4-2 breaks (48%) are 33% more likely than 3-3 breaks (36%). What might we do in the \blacklozenge suit? When we have one hand with long trumps (South) and another with short trumps (North), ruffing in the SHORT hand creates an extra trick, while ruffing in the LONG hand adds no more tricks (Unless you can ruff 3 or more times – a Dummy Reversal). Here \clubsuit suit ruffs offer no extra tricks. The only suit we can ruff in Dummy is \blacklozenge . That

ruff gets us the 1 extra trick we need. **The Play** – Should we win the ♥K? Ducking won't help. We expect to lose 2♥ tricks. Win the ♥A. Should we draw 2 rounds of

trumps 1^{st} ? **NO!** If the defender (West) with $3 \\le cards wins the <math>le$ trick, they will remove dummy's last trump before we ruff the le. Avoid this trap. TAKE $1 \\le trick,$ leaving 2 trumps in Dummy. Now play a small le toward dummy! EW can might take their $2 \\le tricks$. They will not get more. If they can play 3 rounds of le, ruff as high as necessary in hand. You go down only if trumps are 4-0, a very small risk. You play so beautifully!



This Saturday we continue our special summer beginner bridge seminars at 9am in the teaching room before the 10am supervised play session. Phyllis Bishop is presenting on Takeout Doubles. Mike Purcell and Lorna Davis will be running the 10am game.

This week we look at a hand where a takeout double leads to NT instead of a suit.



Tuesday 6/17

Bidding – West with 12 HCP and 5 spades will open 1♠ (12+HCP, 5+ spades). North and East pass. South has 19 HCP with a singleton spade, three hearts, five diamonds and 4 clubs. This hand is too strong for an overcall (6-16 HCP). Better

to start with a takeout double. West passes. North does not have 4 card support for any of the "takeout" suits, but does have 8 HCP and opener's suit well stopped. North's bid is 1NT (8-11 HCP, balanced and with at least one stopper in opponent's suit). South with 19 HCP knows together they have at least 27 HCP and will bid on to game in 3NT.

Play of the Hand – On a spade lead, Declarer (North) has 9 winners $(1 \bigstar, 5 \blacklozenge, 3 \bigstar)$ assuming a reasonable diamond

break (3-2). After running diamonds, play out the clubs for 4 more tricks when they break 3-3 for making 10 tricks or +630.

Post Mortem – When partner makes a takeout double and you have 8-11 HCP, no 4 card major for partner and stoppers in the opener's suit, 1NT is an ideal bid. Most of the time you will play there safely. Every once in a while you will catch partner with extras as allowing you to bid and make a NT game even though the opponent's opened the bidding!
