

Preempt guidelines are helpful! The weak jump shift bidder uses the Rule of 2-3-4-(5) for the initial bid, then stays quiet unless partner forces them to bid. Partner raises the preempt to the level consistent with the number of trumps and the vulnerability.

1<sup>st</sup> seat can be a little frisky, but 2<sup>nd</sup> seat is disciplined. 3<sup>rd</sup> seat is "wide ranging" - strength (HCP) and length. When Vulnerable be less aggressive. At favorable vulnerability (as here with board 5) be super aggressive.

Let's see the Rule of 2-3-4-5 & Law of Total Tricks inaction. Rule of 2-3-4-5: When Rule of 2-3-4-5 making a weak jump overcall, They count your winners. Here East NV Vul +2 has 6 winners in the ♠ suit. Add Vul Vul +3 the following number to your NV NV +4 winners to determine the Vul +5 appropriate level to bid.

At Fav Vul. (They: Vul, we:NV). 6 winners+5= 11. Bid as high as 5♠! East bid 4♠ (game). South's dilemma: 5♥ is


not a sure thing. 2♠ losers and 1 or 2♠ losers possible. 5♥ asserts their game. West bids 5♠ with 3♠s, the ♠K & a doubleton ♥. 4♠ often has 8 trumps (or a good 7 card suit) West sees 11 trumps and bids to the 5 level (11 tricks). Bid to the level of your trump holding - the Law of Total Tricks. 5♠X-3 for -500 beat every -650 and -680 in the field for a top score. Give the opponents the last guess.

# **Newcomer News** — by Mike "Keeping Fun On My Convention Card" Purcell 513 702 4007

This Saturday Lorna Davis, Bob Fisk and Pat Hoffman will be running the 10am game. The 9:30 seminar (NOT 9am) will be on Major Suit Opener Rebids with Minimum Values by Phyllis Bishop.

This week we look at a hand pattern I have come to recognize with experience as one worth being aggressive with.



#### Saturday 7/5

**Bidding** – West with 11 HCP, 3 quick tricks and a good 5 card heart suit opens 1♥ (12-21 HCP, 5+ hearts). Yes we are short a HCP but with at least 2.5 quick tricks and a 5 card suit most players will correctly open this hand. North with 15 HCP and 5 clubs overcalls 2♣. I hold the East hand with 8 HCP but a very nice 5-5 pattern in spades and diamonds. Should I double (8+ HCP, 4+ spades and likely diamonds) or bid 2♠ (10+ HCP, 5+ spades)? When we are 5-5 it is best to strain to bid our suits when we

can. With all the middle cards in both suits and chances to finesse North I strongly suggest this hand will play more like 10 points which makes a 2♠ call right. South with 6 HCP and 4 trumps for partner will raise to 3♣. West with three trumps will compete to 3♠. Now what should I do? My hand is easily worth

11 support points (8 HCP plus 3 for the singleton and doubleton). The quality of my diamond suit suggests we can take 4 tricks even if the opponents have the KQ making this hand worth more like 12-13 support points. In terms of "real" losers I count 6 (2 - 2, 2, 1 - 4). Can partner even with a minimum opening hand cover 3 of them? I think the chances are good so I bid on to game at 4 - 4.

**Play of the Hand** – On a  $\clubsuit4$  lead (fourth best from an honor), Declarer (East) officially has 4 losers ( $1 \spadesuit$ ,  $2 \spadesuit$ ,  $1 \spadesuit$ ) but as we discussed as long as North has either diamond honor we really only have 1 diamond loser. Opponents will win the first club but we can ruff the second one draw two rounds of trump ending in dummy to take the diamond finesse which works. In the end we lose only three tricks for plus +420 and a top board with only 19 HCP. Not too shabby!

**Post Mortem** – As you get more experience you will start to recognize hands that play far beyond their cursory HCP count. Hands with solid suits, like spades and diamonds in this deal, will play extremely well especially when we can count on the opponent's points being in a favorable position. Aggressively bidding these hands will often lead to favorable results.
