Slam? Which Slam? By Steve Moese
You are East playing 2/1 game force. Partner opens 1*. What's your plan? We see 8 HCP, 2 singletons, a 4-card fit for 5 and a 7 -card $\vee$ suit. This is a 5 -loser $\left(1 \stackrel{\wedge}{1}, 1 \frac{1}{2} \downarrow, 1 \stackrel{\wedge}{ }\right.$, and 1.5 - Aces are $1 \frac{1}{2}$ winners, Kings 1 winner and Queen $1 / 2$ winner). So game in $\vee$ or likely, NT not so much. 1v keeps all the options open. Partner rebids 1 s - this tends to show an unbalanced hand with a 5 -card suit (opener can rebid 1 N with a balanced minimum 12-14 HCP). Now what? Since we game is likely

| P | 5 | P | ??? | we must force now. $2 \$$ is the $4^{\text {th }}$ suit - this is an artificial bid (convention) forcing partner to game and asking them to describe their hand. Responder usually has a 5 -card or longer major and is looking for 3 -card support. Opener should:

1) Support Responder's major with 3 cards
2) Rebid their $1^{\text {st }}$ suit to show at least $5+-4$ pattern.
3) Rebid their $2^{\text {nd }}$ suit to show $5-5$
4) Rebid NT to show a stopper in the $4^{\text {th }}$ suit (3NT shows extras!).
5) Raise the $4^{\text {th }}$ suit with 4 card support.
[Sometimes Opener's rebid is not clear. After 1 $\mathbf{N}$-1 1 - 2 with KQxx YKx $\$ \mathrm{x}$ A10xxx, opener chooses the least worst rebid: either or $2 \boldsymbol{}$ (raising on Honor-small can be a good choice in a pinch).]
Over $2 \uparrow$, opener rebids $3 \&$, denying $3 \downarrow$ cards. $3 \downarrow$ sets trumps. Control bids ( $\boldsymbol{\Delta}, \downarrow$ ) follow. $4 \downarrow$ shows a broken 7-card suit. Opener's raise shows a singleton $\vee$ Honor and slam interest. With $2 \vee$ cards, opener

PASS! There might be a loser in $\vee$ and $\&$. The loser in $\vee$ disappears if \& are trumps. Declarer can ruff the $\mathbf{\text { s. }}$. An 8-card $\checkmark$ fit requires the $\vee Q$ be
 stiff or doubleton leaving 1 loser in $\downarrow 67 \%$ of the time! Think: a 1=7 suit doesn't allow ruffs in the short trump hand - a $5=4$ fit does! East, not West, knows! are odds on, not $\Psi$. Bid slams no worse than a finesse.
