Bidding a Distributional Hand by Steve Moese
Tues Oct 7 - Here's a hand where the 149ers and the Open game disagreed. What can we learn? South has a 4-loser

classic 3 rebid. EW will pass here forward. North can mark time with 3 and South might venture $3 N T$, protecting the pointed suit Kings. North makes a SLAM TRY by bidding hand. Some open this 2\%. We recommend 1* because we lack 4 QTs and we need lots of information from partner to choose best strain and level. West will pass (some aggressive Wests will insert $2 \vee!$ ). North has a very nice hand after partner opens. 1v is enough for now. East passes and South has a

(Advanced bidding allows control bidding on any $1^{\text {st }}$ or $2^{\text {nd }}$ round control below the level of game. 4 N is 1430 and $5 \vee$ shows 2 key cards w/o the $Q$. North announces all 5 Keycards. South now chooses among 6\%, 6ث, 6N, and 7\%. 7 shows a long running suit (not missing J10xxxx). With the $Q$ unknown, 6 N is a common Match Point choice. Some say 7 N shows 3 or 4 Kings. Not prudent here. See below.

Opening Lead - East will likely lead a top against 6N, avoiding the risk that a black suit sets up a trick, and revealing the ! QJ doubleton - a poor defensive holding on this bidding.
The Play - Declarer can count 9 top tricks with the potential to develop tricks in and and $\vee$ offer no chance at extra tricks. The best line is to Win the opening lead in North (declarer's hand) and play a toward Dummy (South). The fall of the honor should indicate a restricted choice finesse is odds on. But before putting all our eggs in one basket, our job as declarer is to take all our chances - every one of them. Play on top down. When split 3-3 we no longer have the need to tackle the $2^{\text {nd }}$ round question in $*$. We have 13 tricks. Count them!
Post Mortem -Experienced pairs will reach some slam. 13 Tricks depends on a-3 break or J10 (8 cases - 37.4\%) or - playing for 5 tricks ( $\uparrow$ QJ tight EW, or Singleton honor in W 4 cases - only 12.4\%). Combining changes yields: $37.4 \%+$ $12.4 \%(62.6 \%)=45.2 \%-$ a POOR Grand Slam.

Grand slams at MPs need more than a $50-50$ chance. True odds depend on the field. In a Bd 3 Scores Mps weak field, a small SLAM wins the pot. In a strong field you might need the higher scoring small slam (NT). The Open game bid slam 4 of 5 times. The 149'er didn't bid 1 slam. With strength for Slam, control bidding (leave space available for this) can help identify whether 2 quick losers exist. Key card asks keep us out of bad slams. Avoiding GS when percentages are poor is a winning bridge. Go with the odds. Prefer NT over the minor at Match Point Pairs. Choose the safer slam at IMPs/Teams.

This Saturday Lorna Davis, Bob Fisk and Pam Campbell will be running the 10am game. This week we look at a hand where game is possible even though the opponents open and respond in the bidding.


## Board 18 (Friday 10/7)

Bidding - West in third seat opened the bidding at our table a little light with $1 \downarrow$. North with 14 HCP and support for the other suits, especially the majors, made a takeout double. East with only 5 HCP and five good hearts decided to make life interesting with a weak jump shift to $2 \vee$ ( $0-5 \mathrm{HCP}, 6$ hearts). Sure they were short a heart but with vulnerability in their favor they choose to take up bidding space from the opponents. South has 10 HCP and 6 spades. South should count on a spade fit given partner's takeout double and give themselves 13 support points ( 10 HCP, 2 for extra trump, 1 for the club doubleton). Partner (North) is promising an opening hand so 4as should be a great place to play even if they only have 3 card spade support.

Play of the Hand - On a $\vee 3$ lead (leading partner's suit) declarer (South) has 4 losers $(1 ヵ, 1 \vee, 2 \downarrow)$. One of your diamonds can be ruffed in dummy and when the diamond finesse also works you only have two losers or 11 tricks for +650 .

Post Mortem - When partner promises support and an opening hand, do not be afraid
