Avoid the Feeding Frenzy by Steve Moese

Tues Oct 14 - Sacrificing is a science, not an art. Some auctions get off track. Both sides have equal strength and some distribution. How to know when to sacrifice? Often the clue is in the "Dog that didn't bark." EW are experts. The decision to bid game by West is aggressive but consistent with high level bridge - Put PRESSURE on the opponents to make the last guess. North has only 3♠ cards, 3 cards in ♥s, and 1 Ace. North needs a near opening hand for game or great distribution and 4 trumps for a



Newcomer News - by Mike "Keeping Fun On My Convention Card" Purcell 513 702 4007

This Saturday Lorna Davis and Bob Fisk will be running the 10am game. This week we look at the advantage of opening some 5-4-2-2 semi-balanced hands 1NT.



Board 8 (Tuesday 10/14)

Bidding – Assuming North passes, South has 17 HCP with 5 diamonds and 4 clubs. Some will open the hand 1♦ (12-21 HCP, 3+ Diamonds). North will respond 2♣ (10-11 HCP, 5+ clubs). With North promised 10 HCP, South knows game is likely and with 8 HCP in the majors and no singleton should prefer 3NT to a possible club game. Sure spades are a concern but partner's points have to be somewhere right? Even if North does not have a spade stopper, opponents still have to lead a spade with one of them having 5 to set you.

If South Opens 1NT - South could also open 1NT (15-17 HCP, balanced). While South does

have two doubletons, they have strong values in both of them and would prefer a heart or even a spade lead coming to them and not through them on opening lead. For these reasons, 1NT is

the better call as it guarantees they will declare a NT hand. After 1NT North has an easy 3NT response with their 10 HCP and 6 clubs.

Play of the Hand – On a $\triangle J$ lead (J from J10) declarer (South) has 10 winners ($2 \triangle , 1 \heartsuit$, $1 \diamondsuit$, $6 \triangle$) if they do not take their $\triangle A$. Assuming East wins their king and returns a heart, you will not have the opportunity to gain any further overtricks scoring +430.
