

This event will teach the most basic bridge concepts with hands on play. Attendees can then continue on with beginner lessons complemented with Informal Supervised Play Saturday mornings 10-noon. ### Hand of the Week

This week features a hand from Tues night where the minors finally win out over the majors:



EW 6♦; EW 4N; NS 2♠; W 2♥; EW 2♠; E 1♥; Par −1100: NS 6♠×−4

Bidding – West with 12 HCP and 6 diamonds opens
1 ◆ (12+ HCP, 3+ diamonds). North has 6 spades, 5
hearts and 11 HCP. Many in the open game will
make a Michael's Cuebid (Ctrl+Click for more info), in
this case 2 ◆ (typically 5-5 in the Majors, less or
greater than opening strength) to show this hand.
East has 14 HCP and both majors stopped. Their best
bid is 3NT. South has a very weak hand with support
for partner's spades and shortness in hearts. With
game likely for the opponent's, South should
consider a 4 ◆ call if they believe they can keep from
going down doubled 2 tricks (-500) or less. This is
what happened at our table. Most West's after a 4 ◆
bid will go to a 5 ◆ game.

Play of the Hand – On a ▼K lead declarer (West) has 6 losers (2♥, 4♠) but can pitch two losers on spades in dummy and can ruff clubs in dummy. Win the ♥A and immediate cash two spades pitching away your heart losers. Now play on clubs finessing the ♠Q in South. North will win the ♠A but on any return you can finesse clubs again, ruff a club in dummy and



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
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then draw trumps to win the remaining tricks. On this line of play you will win 12 tricks total or +620.

Post Mortem – Note on this deal using Michael's Cuebid will make it more likely N-S will compete to 4♠ keeping opponent's out of 3NT which scores 10 tricks for +630 and a better result than the diamond game.

Post Mortem II – Many East's will be tempted to double a 4♠ contract and understandably so. West however has a very poor hand for defense and should insist on a game in diamonds with their long suit and distributional values.
