Hand of the Week

This week features a Friday hand where getting to game is better than letting the opponents sacrifice:

Bidding - North has 10 HCP and 7 diamonds. With 2.5 quick tricks this hand is too strong to preempt with. Best to pass or open $1 \uparrow$. Let's assume a pass for now. East with 13 HCP and 5 spades will open 14 ( $12-21$ HCP, $5+$ spades). South has 16 HCP, 5 hearts and spades well-stopped. Since the heart suit is so strong I favor bidding $2 \downarrow$ here over 1NT. West has 4 support points for spades ( $1 \mathrm{HCP}, 3$ more for the void). They also know hearts are breaking very badly. While tempted to bid 24 or 3\& (very weak, 4+ trump) non-vulnerable versus vulnerable, most will pass. North can freely bid $3 \diamond$ ( $5+$ diamonds, $0-2$ hearts, $10-$ 11 HCP ). If East passes, South will rebid 3NT showing their spade stoppers. If East rebids instead, South can take partner to game with a $5 \diamond$ call as their hand is worth 17 points in support of diamonds.
If West responds a weak 3^ - If you play after 1^ $2 \vee$ a cue bid of $3 \vee$ by West shows a limit raise in spades, you can play a direct 3a call as a weak hand ( $0-5 \mathrm{HCP}$ ) with $4-5$ spades. West only has three spades but with a void and not vulnerable versus vulnerable opponents a few brave West players will
 has a very tough bid. While 4 could be right they
will be wishing they had opened $1 \diamond$ to start. Many North players will pass and West with a very distributional hand with solid clubs will raise to 4s effectively keeping N-S from getting to their game. If North opens 1 - - Since we would open 1 * with 11 HCP, 2.5 quick tricks and a rebiddable suit, opening it with $10 \mathrm{HCP}, 2.5$ quick tricks and extra diamonds is understandable and likely a better choice than passing. East will overcall 14. South can response $2 \downarrow$ (10+HCP, 5+ hearts). North can rebid $3 \diamond$ and South will rebid $3 N T$. If East competes at $4 \boldsymbol{e}$, South can cue bid 4as a mild slam try in diamonds. North has at least 14 support points for diamonds ( $10 \mathrm{HCP}, 2$ for the singleton 1 for the doubleton, and at least one more for extra trump). Still South needs the right cards to make slam and it is safest to play in $5 *$ or 4NT.

Play of the Hand - Playing $5 *$ with a K lead ( K from KQ) from East, Declarer (North) has 4 losers (2@, 2\&). We can pitch club losers on good hearts in dummy and we can finesse for the $\boldsymbol{\Delta}$ to set up their $\boldsymbol{\alpha}$ eliminate another loser. The best play is to win the A, draw trump and run 3 hearts pitching clubs from the North hand. You can return to the North hand by trumping (ruffing) a heart and then take your spade finesse. This line of play yields 12 tricks or +620 .

If you are playing 3NT or 4NT with the same sk lead, you have 11 winners ( $3 \vee, 7 \downarrow, 1 \&)$ for +660 .

Post Mortem - This hand can be bid a variety of ways and is why bridge is such a fascinating game. On this vulnerability, E-W can afford to go down 3 doubled versus letting N-S make a game. Conversely, N-S should insist on game ( $5 \diamond$ or $4 N T$ ) over doubling a 44 contract for the best result.
