## Hand of the Week

This week features a Friday hand where valuing up a long running suit is key to reaching slam.


NS 6v; NS 5N; NS 5~; NS 1s; NS 1ヶ; Par +980

Bidding - North has 14 HCP and 7 running hearts. With 8 quick tricks ( $7 \boldsymbol{( 1 )} \mathbf{1 2}$ ) we are actually very close to a strong 2 opener ( $22+\mathrm{HCP}$ or 8.5 quick tricks). Not quite good enough for 2* so North opens 1 (1221 HCP, 5+ hearts) and will look to jump raise to $3 \downarrow$ later. South has 12 HCP and should be thinking of getting to game. Their response is 19 ( $6+\mathrm{HCP}, 4+$ spades). North has a spade void rebids $3 \Upsilon$ (18-21, $6+$ hearts) as planned. South now knows there is a heart fit, roughly 30-33 points (or equivalent) and a possible slam when they add their points to partner's hand. If you play 1430 Roman Keycard Blackwood, you are likely to bid 4NT to see if partner has the
missing aces and the 9 K. North will respond 5 ( 0 or 3 ) and South with all the key cards will place the contract at 6\%. If you play Blackwood, you will be less likely to try for slam since you cannot place the YK settling for 4४ instead.

Play of the Hand - Assuming a $\$ 5$ lead (fourth best), Declarer (North) has 3 losers ( $2 \boldsymbol{*}, 1 \boldsymbol{*}$ ). Declarer can ruff a diamond and pitch a club loser on the $\uparrow \mathrm{A}$ in dummy to make 12 tricks for +980 .

If you get a trump lead - a trump lead eliminates the possibility to ruff diamonds if the opponents continue trump after winning the second diamond. In this case the only play to make is to hope for a 3-3 club break so you can pitch your two diamond losers on the $\uparrow A$ and the fourth club. Best play here is to draw trump and exit a low club. Even if opponents win the club and switch to a diamond you can win the $\downarrow$ A, run clubs and cash the $\boldsymbol{A}$ to make your contract.

Post Mortem - When you have a big hand like North on this deal, you need to jump rebid to show strength to partner. If you play Roman Keycard Blackwood (regular or 1430) you will feel better about exploring for slam when it is close than if you play Blackwood because you can confirm the king of trump for your side.

Post Mortem II - Even if you did not bid slam making the 12 tricks ( +480 ) gives you a much better score than settling for 11 tricks ( +450 ). Overtricks in matchpoint scoring are often critical in getting a good result. On this deal +480 gets you a top board in the NLM game.
