## Hand of the Week

This week features a hand from Friday where a long heart suit is worth more than just a few HCP:

Bidding - North with 17 HCP, 6 diamonds and four spades will open 1 (12-21 HCP, $3+$ diamonds). South has only 3 HCP but 8 hearts to the QJ . This is not your typical bridge lesson hand. What should you do? Well South does have their own 8 card major suit fit so if we count distribution we have at least 7 support points in hearts. Many people will be tempted to bid $2 \vee$ ( 6 hearts, preemptive). With this many hearts this is actually an underbid. You could jump directly to 4ソ (8+ hearts, preemptive) or you could bid $1 \vee$ ( $6+$ points, $4+$ hearts) and look to keep bidding hearts at every opportunity. North with only 1 heart but a big hand can reverse with a $2 \boldsymbol{A}$ call ( $16+$ points, at least 5 diamonds and 4 spades). Especially when North shows extra values and spade strength, South with three little spades now covered should feel good about going to $4 \boldsymbol{\Downarrow}$. Game makes sense as partner only needs to provide 4 tricks for you to make game in many cases assuming you can take 6 trump tricks.

Play of the Hand - On a lead from West (fourth best), Declarer (South) has 4 losers ( $2 \boldsymbol{Q}, 2 \vee$ ), maybe 5 if hearts break poorly. The best play is to immediately draw trump. If the defense does not find a spade switch, you can afford take a diamond finesse which works to make $5 \vee$ for +650 . Otherwise it is best to settle for making $4 \vee$ versus going down if the finesse fails.

Post Mortem - Long trump suits are worth far more than their HCP would indicate. Do not be afraid to be aggressive when you have a long suit like hearts on this deal. Many times you will win either by making your contract or keeping the opponents from doing better playing in their suit.
