## Hand of the Week

This week features a hand where a first seat preempt makes getting to game hard:

Bidding - East with 10 HCP and 7 diamonds with 2 of the top 3 honors will open $3 \diamond$ ( $5-10 \mathrm{HCP}, 7$ cards) on even vulnerability. South has 12 HCP and 5 hearts. We are taught to have a better hand to bid over a 3level preempt but these days an opening hand and a
solid suit is enough for some players to come in with $3 \vee$. After a South $3 \vee$ call, North has an easy raise to $4 \vee$ on a hand worth 15 support points ( 13 HCP plus one more for extra trump and 1 for the doubleton). If South passes, North with 13 HCP and support for the other suits should reopen the bidding with a double. South with 12 HCP and 5 hearts knows there are game values between the two hands and can jump immediately to $4 \vee$.

Play of the Hand - On a $\$ 9$ lead from West (top of nothing to partner's suit), Declarer (South) has 4 losers ( $1 \uparrow, 1 \downarrow, 2 \boldsymbol{2})$. After winning the $\downarrow \mathrm{A}$ and with 9 trumps, the best play is to play the $\Psi$ A and $\Psi K$ to drop the $\vee \mathrm{Q}$. Then play two rounds of spades, $\uparrow \mathrm{K}$ then $\uparrow \mathrm{A}$, to end in the South hand. With the still out and given East's preempt, it is best to play for the oddson 4-2 break and finesse for the $\boldsymbol{J}$. This works and allows you to pitch another loser. In all you get 11 tricks for +650 .

Post Mortem - In bridge, preemptive bidding by opponents can make it hard to reach the right contract. That is why we have these bids. Still in many cases there are bidding tools available to us to help us reach a good contract.

Post Mortem II - During the play always look for overtricks. On this deal you get a chance to develop a spade trick. Even if the finesse fails, you can still pitch a club loser on the fourth spade before the opponents can set up the suit so there is no risk to this play. In the open game, making the extra trick was worth 5MP!!!
