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
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Hand of the Week

This week features a Tuesday Night hand where overtricks are needed to score well:



Bidding – With 18 HCP balanced East is too strong to open 1NT. Instead they will open 1♣ (12-21 HCP, 3+ clubs) and look to raise to 2NT later unless a heart fit is found. West has 11 HCP and 5 diamonds. While the diamonds are solid it is unlikely partner has enough support after opening clubs to make a diamond contract worthwhile. Better to show a balanced invitational hand in NT with a 2NT response (10-12 HCP, balanced and invitational to 3NT). East should ponder slam but with only 28-30 HCP they should settle for game in 3NT.

Play of the Hand — Assuming a ♣J lead (top of a series) by North, declarer (West) has 9 winners (2♠, 1♥, 5♠, 1♠). Do not settle for just making game here. Winning bridge means looking for overtricks while you have the opponent's suits stopped. Where can we develop more tricks? Your heart and club suits are both worth considering. Clubs is the best choice as this suit is slightly higher quality (AQ109 versus AQ108 in hearts). There is also a chance in clubs to win all 4 tricks if KJ is on side. Not so in hearts. Best play is to win the ♠K and lead the ♣9 to finesse. This

loses to the \clubsuit K but implies the \clubsuit J is in the North hand and can be captured later. When opponents return spades win in dummy and finesse clubs again to pick up the rest of the suit. This line of play yields 11 tricks $(2\spadesuit, 1\heartsuit, 5\spadesuit, 3\clubsuit)$ for +660.

Post Mortem – In matchpoints overtricks can mean the difference between a good or bad result. On this deal in the NLM game just making 3NT is a near bottom result. In the open game even making 10 tricks for 4NT is below average. When choosing which suit to work on for overtricks in NT consider the tricks you can gain and if you can stop the opponents from running their suit in time to develop them. On this deal you already have a winner in hearts and clubs but only clubs gives you a chance to run all four tricks if the KJ is onside.
