## Hand of the Week

This week features a Friday hand where 25 HCP is more than enough for slam:

Bidding - East has 17 HCP, 7 clubs and a void. This hand plays better than most because the clubs are so solid. It will play like 19-21 points in most situations. East can start by opening 12 (12-21 HCP, 3+ clubs) and look to reach game somewhere if partner can respond in anything other than spades. West has 8 HCP with 6 hearts and 5 spades. If they find a fit with partner in either major their hand is worth at least 12 support points ( 8 HCP plus 4 more for the singletons). On a super distributional hand like this one you need to be aggressive. Start though with a 19 response (6+ HCP, 4+ hearts).
East must show their strong hand but will also be tempted to raise hearts on only 3 card support. Most will jump to 3e (18-21 points, 6+ clubs) with their solid club suit and working heart points for partner. After 3i, West should be thinking game is a minimum now and should not give up on their majors. They can bid 3a to show at least a 5-4 major suit pattern. East can easily raise to game in $4 \checkmark$ with 3 card support now. West knowing their hand is worth 13 support points ( $8 \mathrm{HCP}, 4$ for two singletons and one more for the extra trump) in hearts plus partner's 18-21 points or 31-34 total should explore for slam. After 4NT (asking for aces or key cards) and missing only one ace, $6 \vee$ seems right.

Play of the Hand - Assuming a $\diamond K$ lead (top of a series) by North, declarer (West) has 5 spade losers. You cannot ruff all of them in dummy. You need to set up clubs to make your contract. Win the $\downarrow$ A, then the A and K K. When you see the Q fall on the second club trick you know your suit is set up. Draw trump ending in dummy and run the remaining clubs pitching all your spade losers to make all 13 tricks and + 1460.

Post Mortem - The key on this deal is realizing both the East and West hands are worth more than their high card points (HCP). East can upgrade their hand because their club suit is so solid they could play in clubs as trump opposite a void! West with 6-5
distribution has the equivalent of a good opener if a major fit is found.
