## Hand of the Week

This week features a Friday hand that takes excellent defense to keep N-S from making game:

Bidding - North with 14 HCP and 5 clubs opens 1e (12-21 HCP, $3+$ clubs). South with 9 HCP and 6 spades has an easy 14 response (6+ HCP, 4+ spades). Even if West gets in an aggressive takeout double (opening hand, at least 4-4 in the unbid suits), North without spades support and a balanced hand can rebid 1 NT. If West doubled showing diamonds and hearts, East can bid to $2 \vee$ (6-9 HCP, 4+ diamonds) responding to partner like they had opened. If you hold the South hand, do not let all this bidding discourage you. When partner bid 1NT they promised 2 spade cards to make a spade fit. Your hand is worth 11 support points ( 9 HCP and 2 more for your doubletons). Your points are concentrated in your suit and partners opening suit (clubs). Invite to game with a 3 call (10-12 points, invitational). North with a maximum hand (14-15 support points) will bid on to game in 4as.

Play of the Hand - The standard lead from West will be the sA (Ace from AK). Declarer (South) has 5 losers ( $1 \vee, 2 \downarrow, 2 \&$ ). Three of these, the clubs and heart can be taken from the beginning. South's only hope to make the contract is to set up the clubs in dummy to pitch their losing diamonds. Looking at the results, we see this happened at most tables. West after winning the \& either continued with the ${ }^{\boldsymbol{*} K}$ hoping to give partner a ruff or they switched to hearts and partner came back clubs instead of diamonds. Either way, declarer can draw trumps and get to dummy to run clubs for 10 tricks (6a, 1ヶ, 1*, 2s) and +620 .

Post Mortem - This is another example of aggressive bidding paying off. Even though N-S can be held to only 34 finding the defense can be hard as on this deal. At 14 tables spades was the contract. 10 out of $14 \mathrm{~N}-\mathrm{S}$ pairs made the 10 tricks needed for game.

Post Mortem II - When West leads the \&A, East must give a discouraging signal card to switch to another suit. If E-W are in the bidding with East supporting diamonds, West will likely switch to this suit and set the contract. If not and West switches to hearts, East
must win their ace and switch to a diamond. If West doubles in the auction it will be much easier for East to decide the diamond switch is right.
