

Hand of the Week

This week features a Friday deal where North has 16 HCP and almost game in hand.



NS 4♥; NS 5♦; NS 2♠; EW 2♣; Par +620



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
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Bidding – On this deal West has 7 clubs. Many people will open 3♣ (6+ clubs, 5-11 HCP). North has 16 HCP with 6 hearts and 5 diamonds. This hand will play better than its HCP as the opponents can only take 2 tricks immediately. If partner has a little as 3 hearts and 0 HCP they may be able to make game. On auctions like these partner is expected to have about 8 HCP and 2-3 hearts so bidding 4♥ directly makes sense. If North only bids 3♥ there is too much risk partner with a weak hand (0-6 HCP) will pass. If West passes - North can open 1♥ (12-21 HCP, 5+ hearts). East will overcall 1♠ (8-16 HCP, 5+ spades). South with a spade stack will pass hoping partner can make a reopening double that they can convert for penalties. If this happens West with 7 clubs can come to the rescue with a 2♣ call. After 2♣, North knowing partner must have some values to leave the 1♠ double in can go to 4♥ as before.

Play of the Hand – On a club lead from East, declarer (North) has three losers (1 - 1), 1 - 1 and no hope to improve. Still that's 10 tricks for +620.

Post Mortem – With hands that have unique distribution like North's on this deal you need to think beyond HCP and focus more on what losers you have. On this deal North's partner actually has a pretty poor hand in support of hearts but game is still cold.
