

Hand of the Week

This week features a Tuesday night deal where 26 HCP is enough for slam:



EW 7♠; EW 4N; EW 5♠; EW 2♥; EW 1♦; Par -1510

Bidding — West with 17 HCP and 5 hearts opens 1♥ (12-21 HCP, 5+ hearts). East with 9 HCP and 6 spades has an easy 1♠ response (6+ HCP, 4+ spades). West has spade support and a hand worth at least 20 support points (17 HCP and3 more for the void). Even if East is a minimum game should be possible and West should bid it at 4♠. East should re-evaluate their hand before settling for game. With a spade fit found the East hand is worth 14 support points: 9 HCP plus 3 for the void and 2 more for extra trump over the 4 they promised in the bidding. This plus partner promising 18-21 point is more than enough for slam. Many East's will bid 6♠ directly. If they ask for key cards, West will need to show their 2 key cards (♠A and ♠K) and a useful void to get to slam.



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

Their response is usually 5NT (even number of key cards and a useful void). East unsure if West has a wasted heart ace will settle for $6 ilde{.}$

If South opens 2 → - West should double for takeout (12+ HCP, support for all suits except diamonds). North with diamond support can and should raise to 3 → or even 4 →. Regardless East's hand is still worth 13-14 support points for spades so bidding 4 → makes sense. When East shows a hand that will play like an opener West with their 20 support points should pursue slam. If they ask for key cards East can bid 6 → (odd number of key cards and a useful void). If West instead cue bids their first round control in diamonds (5 →) East can bid 5 →. That should be enough for East to reach 6 →.

Play of the Hand — From the East hand you have 4 losers (4♦). Best play is to ruff as many diamonds as possible. You can also take a roughing finesse in hearts to pitch another diamond loser. Depending on the lead you will likely make 12 or 13 tricks for +980 or +1010.

Post Mortem – Once again the power of distribution is on display on this deal. Having a way to show usual voids in these auctions is critical to reaching slam.
