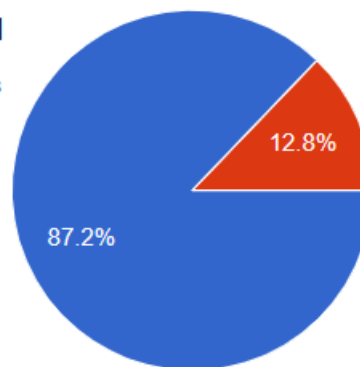

Bob Jones **Pass** Don't even think about bidding. The void in partner's suit is a strong warning.

Steve Vogel **Pass** I could not imagine taking a bid in this situation with a void in partner's suit and no expectation of heart support.

Joe Muenks **Pass** Epls. The question is what to lead; does declarer have QJ of hearts and partner xx or does declarer have QJx and partner xx with an entry. I'd likely try a low heart on the go and just hope.

Bob Fisk **Pass** Your partner has already preempted in Diamonds. How many tricks do you think the opponents are taking with Spades or Clubs as trump? If you said a zillion, you're close. If you bid 4♥ here (horrors), the best that can happen is that you go down three doubled for -500. The worst that can happen is that you push them into 6♣ or 6♠. Cash your ♥A and ♥K, and hope like heck that Hearts were 7-2-2-2 around the table. I said heck.

Steve Moese **Pass** Sure we have a mighty fine heart suit. But we stand to lose 7-8 tricks. Besides, west still has a bid and might choose a black suit. 😊

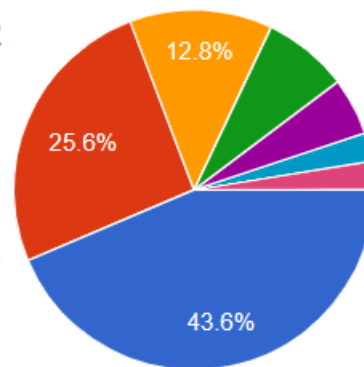

Bob Jones **2♦** Experts play 2♥ here as not forcing. They prefer to bid the “new” minor and rely on partner to bid 2♥ if he has four of them. It’s a good idea. Bid 2♦.

Steve Vogel **2♣** (XYZ) I have an invitational hand, and all such hands go through 2♣ (following 3 one-level bids) when playing XYZ. Over partner’s forced 2♦ rebid, I will bid 2♥ showing an invitational hand with 5+ spades and 4+ hearts. Partner’s next bid will typically set the final contract.

Joe Muenks **2♣** Those playing XYZ, like the majority, will bid 2♣ then follow the 2♦ relay with 2♥ showing 5+ spades and 4+ hearts and 10-12 playing points. Those playing standard bid 2♥ showing 5+ spades, 4+ hearts and 10+ pts. Playing XYZ, a direct 2♥ call is non-forcing and never as many as 10 points.

Bob Fisk **N/A** I refused to answer, because I play that a 2♠ bid over partner's 1m opening shows exactly five Spades, four Hearts, and invitational values. Cute, huh? When you have that agreement, the following sequence shows an invitational hand with 5-5 in the majors: 1m-1♠; 1NT-2♣ (Alert); 2♦ (Alert)-2♥. Bridge is easy!

Steve Moese **2♣** XYZ. Playing New Minor Forcing bid 2. Playing check back or 2-way new minor forcing, bid 2♣. Playing standard American with no convention here rebid 2♥. So you see, the bid depends on your agreements. Do not rebid 2♠. This hand is too good and the spades are only 5-carded.

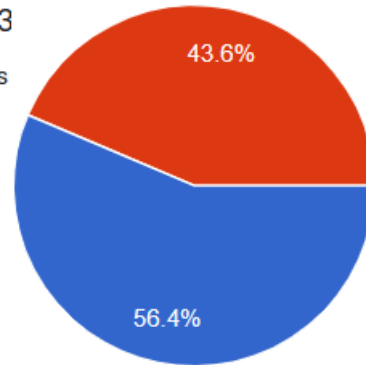

Bob Jones **1♥** The 5-card suit and the powerful 10 of spades make this hand too good for a 15-17 1NT. Open **1♥**, planning to rebid 2NT over a **1♠** or 1NT response.

Steve Vogel **1♥** My plan is to rebid 2NT over partner's expected response of **1♠** or 1NT. This hand, with 17 HCP and a good 5-card heart suit, values out to 18+ points, which is why I choose not to open 1NT.

Joe Muenks **1NT** Epls. With 2 small clubs I cannot upgrade this to 18, though many 17 HCP hands with a 5-card suit will open 1 of a suit and rebid 2NT. (I'm predicting half the commenters open **1♥** and jump in NT next.)

Bob Fisk **1♥** Okay, this one is slightly too good to open 1NT, so I'll open **1♥** and rebid 2NT if I get the chance. The advantage, of course, is that partner might hold Kx xxxx Axxxx xx and pass 1NT when we're cold for **4♥**.

Steve Moese **1♥** This hands is too good for 15-17 1NT. If you will accept a game try after opening one of a Major, you should not open 1NT. I intend to treat this as 18 and rebid 2NT.

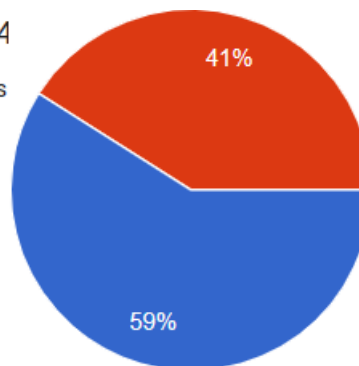

Bob Jones 2♠ Rebidding 2♣ will not get you kicked off the team, but we prefer to raise. Bid 2♠.

Steve Vogel 2♣ If I had a minimum hand, I would rebid 2♠. This hand, with heart shortness, values out at more than 14 points in a suit contract, so my plan is to support partner's spades with my next bid, showing my 3-1-5-4 shape with extras. There is a chance that partner could pass over my 2♣ rebid, but you cannot cover all contingencies.

Joe Muenks 2♠ Epls. There are so many people who play 2NT over this auction asking for opener's hand, but always find partner with 4 trump since they hesitate to raise on 3, the reason the convention came into being in the first place. Standard players bid 2♣ here.

Bob Fisk 2♠ If partner bids 2NT (Spiral), I can bid 3♦ to show a maximum hand with only three Spades. If I raise partner's major with only three, I'll have shortness somewhere (i.e., I'm not doing it on AQx xx J9xx AKTx).

Steve Moese 2♣ 2♣ - or 2♠ when playing Wold/spiral ask by opener. I have no rebid problem after 2♣. 2♠ works when partner can ask about my trump length and strength. Without that, raising on three is ok but partner needs to be comfortable playing a 4-3 fit in game. After 2♣, if partner passes we are in a good spot. If partner bids 2♥ or 2♦ we answer with 2♠ showing 3=1=5=4 and 14+. If partner responds 2NT we can rebid 3♠, delivering the same message (Partner will choose between 4♠ and 3NT).

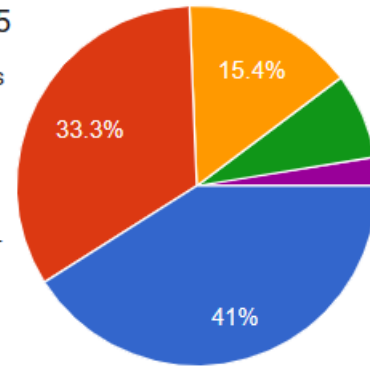

Bob Jones **2NT** Partner hasn't got a 4-card major, so don't bother bidding one of yours. Bid 2NT.

Steve Vogel **Pass** Partner's 2♣ rebid denies a 4-card major, and I have no reason to believe we have a better diamond fit than club fit. Given we have no fit, 10 points is not sufficient to take another bid.

Joe Muenks **2NT** This time there are 0 bids you want to make but 3 that are possible. They are 2NT, 2♦ and pass in my order of preference, though any of the 3 might work better some days. 2NT is right on values but that void is really gross. 2♦ is short a diamond but your extra values might carry the day and the ♦T is important here. Pass is most sensible, the adage being "once a mismatch is uncovered stop bidding without a lot of extra values or it just gets worse."

Bob Fisk **N/A** I would have bid 1♥ over 1♣, since I'm not hiding my 4-card major(s) to show my stupid Diamonds unless I have (1) longer Diamonds and (2) an opening hand or better. Nope.

Steve Moese **2NT** We have invitational values and a major flaw. Passing could be right but partner just might have enough for game. The risk we take is pushing partner to 3♣. But that's another bidding problem we do not have yet. By the way, partner likely does not have a 4-card major since 1M was an available rebid.

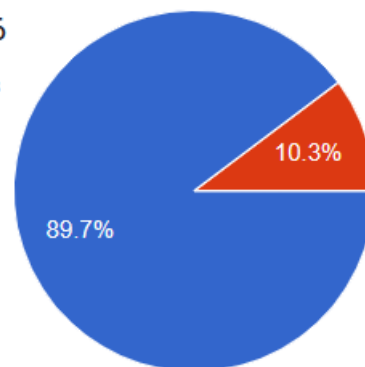

Bob Jones **Pass** It was reasonable to respond with this hand, but don't bid again. Partner might not make even 9 tricks with this dummy. Pass.

Steve Vogel **Pass** No fit for partner, and my high card points are all defensive in nature (queens and jacks), except for the spade jack. Best to pass, and hope partner can make 3♠.

Joe Muenks **Pass** Epls. I wrote the adage above before seeing this hand, where we can apply it and get out, play dummy well and hope partner can rack up +140 not -50.

Bob Fisk **Pass** It's quite possible that my hand will generate zero tricks for partner. Is it possible that partner holds Axxxxx xx AK AKx and we can make 5♣? Yes, but that's playing partner for perfect cards, and we don't do that (or we do that at our own peril).

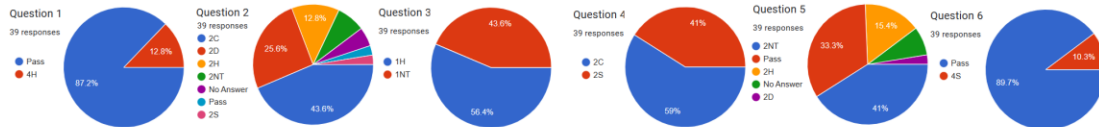
Steve Moese **Pass** Thinking is an overbid. Partners jump shows 15-17 or 16-18. We are going nowhere with our hand. Any new suit bid by us is now game forcing agreeing spades, and 3NT is so far from our values we need the James Webb Telescope to see it. Partner will like the ♠J.
