We began with the Knock-out on Tuesday. We won our first match. The next match was a 3-way. Each team won one and lost one. We ended up with a -5 score. Another team was worse and we moved on as a lucky loser. We had won 4.74 gold points, 1/100 less than the gold points needed. Agonizingly close, must do well tomorrow!

We rendezvous Wednesday morning to ride to Sharonville together. Linda is giddy. After scanning the "Bridge Bulletin", she discovered that all she needed was 4.73 gold points, so she did have all of her gold points. Now all she needs is 2.03 red points . All week came down to this last board. UGH! We did not bid the slam. Everyone was deflated. Anxiously we waited for the results to be posted. We came in 7<sup>th</sup> and won 2.02 points. Again 1 / 100 of a point short of our goal. The agony of defeat! The hospitality room beckoned to help us forget. Then Linda remembered, she received an extra 1 / 100 of a point yesterday! We welcome everyone especially new players.



How many sessions at the Regional do you think the typical player played? I'm pleased to report that this year's number was 5.83 -- the highest it's been in at least a decade. # **District 11 News**

Four times a year the District 11 Board of Directors meet and conducts business relevant to the Units and our tournaments. I have had the pleasure and responsibility as one of two voting members on that Board. I thought you might like to see what has been done in the past s meetings.

# **Major Decisions:**

- Revision and adoption District 11 Bylaws. This is no small undertaking. Credit to Terrell Holt (President) and Marybeth Ransell (Secretary) for finding consensus and closure on a major improvement. Of note is a specific reference to the fiduciary responsibilities of the District Board members and our need to avoid actual, potential, or perceived conflict of interest.
- 2) District 11 Tournament Handbook This is a heroic effort by AJ Stephani (District 11 Tournament Coordinator). This procedure document enables smooth operation of all planning and execution for sectionals and Regionals in our District.

Our tournament committees would help future Unit Leaders by documenting best practices for the Flying Pig Regional and Spooktacular Sectional – a Procedures Manual for Unit 124.

- 3) NAP Finals Site Decision After a positive experience at the CBC in one dedicated weekend last year, the Board unanimously approved Cincinnati as the PERMANENT SITE for the D11 NAP Finals. The basis for the decision was our facility, our central location in the D11 geography and the proximity of hotels and restaurants.
- 4) GNT Finals Site Decision After much discussion, there was agreement that all Units may propose hosting this tournament. Cincinnati will host the 2016 event and Dayton will host the 2017 event. While Indianapolis had expressed a desire to have this site rotate among the Units, not everyone was able to support their turn.
- 5) **District Assets** We determined that the District owns bidding boxes and they will no longer be available for use by Sectional Tournaments.

7) **Board Minutes** are of high quality and rich detail. Marybeth Ransell uses an audio recording to capture decisions, supporting facts, and Q&A form the discussion. Here are the more recent meeting minutes:

The District delegates Regionals to Units who manage the gain/loss from the tournament. The District manages Grass Roots Fund monies to supplement payments to NAP and GNT qualifiers. # **Play Proprieties**

## **By Potter Orr**

While not an actual "rule", you might give some thought to how you sort your cards. Few people I know can leave their cards in random order like a certain 24,000 MP member of our club, but there are issues. Consider this hand:



I managed red-black and have only 4 suits but it is still not perfect. Imagine yourself as an opponent of the person holding this hand. Clubs are lead and the King comes out as the **SECOND** card from the end. What does that mean?

On the first lead of spades, the <u>SECOND</u> card from the right end of the hand is played. What could that mean? While it is not exactly proper, some opponents will watch where a card comes from. The solution is simple. Here is the same hand:



Short suits are in the middle and whichever suit ends up on the left end is sorted low to high. Now cards from the end of the hand are all small and high cards come from the middle. This is not to say that an opponent might not try to guess, but if you suspect that, missort your hand for that person just for fun.

As long as we are on the topic of playing cards, let's talk about the rules.

<u>Defenders</u> A card is deemed played as soon as it is in a position where it <u>could</u> be seen by defender's partner. Whether it was seen is not relevant, if it could have been seen, it is played. A defender may not play a card until it is their turn (no surprise) <u>and</u> they may not detach a card from their hand even if face down before it is their turn. Pulling a card early is both rude and against the rules as it might impart information to the defender who has not played yet. The sole exception is

that if declarer leads and calls for a card from dummy before  $\mathbf{1}^{st}$  defender plays, the  $\mathbf{2}^{nd}$  defender may play a card.

<u>Declarer</u> A card is deemed played when is detached from his hand and placed on or near the table. A card is deemed played from the dummy when declarer calls for it's play. There is no "same breath" correction exception. A card is played when called for. If declarer simply says "play", it means the lowest card in the suit. If declarer says "play anything", either defender may specify which card from dummy will be played. If declarer leads from the wrong hand and defenders do not accept that lead, the lead reverts to the correct hand with no penalty cards. If declarer leads a spade from dummy when lead was in his hand and defenders object, declarer must lead from hand but does not have to lead a spade.

Bidding Box Use We all know what they are for and the basics of their use, but there are a few issues still. First and foremost – do not move your hand anywhere near the bidding box until you **know** what you want to bid. Massaging the bid cards is wildly inappropriate. Moving your hand between the bid cards and the pass/double cards clearly send a message. Touching any card and then pulling your hand back is just as bad. That said, the rules make allowance for pulling out the wrong bid. If you intend to bid 1 spade and pull 1 NT by mistake and place it on the table and then realize your mistake, you may change the bid without penalty. Note that this only applies to an actual mechanical mistake. If you realize that you have made a mechanical mistake you may correct it any time before your partner bids even if your left hand opponent has bid. Please call the director in this case. By the way, the rules consider that mechanical mistakes can only occur in one section of the bidding box. Pulling a double instead of a pass or one bid instead of another can be mechanical but not pulling a pass instead of a bid or vice versa.

# FORBEARANCE - KEY QUALITY IN RUBBER BRIDGE

The spotlight is on **you**. You hold ♠x, ♥10xx, ♦1098xxx, ♣10xx and the bidding has proceeded rapidly: 1♣ on your left, 4NT on your right, 5♥, 7NT. You lead the 10 of diamonds.

I joined the Cincinnati Whist Club about 20 years ago. It is certainly one of the oldest bridge clubs in the country, now in its third century. We have a framed certificate of enrolment in the American Whist League dated Nov. 1896, and it has been in continuous existence since at least that time. When I joined, the Club was located downtown adjacent to the Mercantile Library. Members had been playing bridge during their lunch hour and after work. Just as in the ACBL, they became older and retired. So we moved to a new building out in the suburban area. A number of our stalwarts died, others drifted away, and the economy may have had some effect. At any rate, we are no

longer able to afford our own premises, so we have had to move into the old home where our leading member resides.

But we still have a lively bridge game several days a week. Our tradition is to play Chicago, changing partners every four deals. Scoring by green points serves to concentrate one's attention, at every level. In duplicate, when the game is not going well, there is no incentive to finish at the same level of attention you start out with. In tournaments, your team may get knocked out in the first or early round, and you cannot succeed that day. But in money bridge, like investing, you never know when opportunity for gain (or loss) may arise. Even on the worst of hands.

Here is the story of your 10-high hand. On the first hand of the set, right hand opponent opens 1NT and plays it, making three. The dummy produces ♠ xx ♥ xx ♦AJxxx ♣ Kxxx. Now the opponents are perhaps our two youngest members, but they insist upon playing the Col. Buller system that one time brought down the Culbertson team. Most other members play a mid-20<sup>th</sup> century style, so that you can change partners without slowing down for discussion of bidding. The dummy, an author and skilled poker player, has a firm belief that one should have a part score when vulnerable on the next deal. Declarer, with ♦KQx, couldn't agree on this hand. (It was a perfect hand for their system. Even 1NT could go down. Responder should bid 2♦, and opener with his fit and stoppers will try 2NT, which responder can raise to game.) As happens often in this game, the point is made on the very next hand. I open 1NT, you bid 2♣, 2♠, 2NT, 3NT (not vul. vs. vul.). The captain of industry leads the 5♥ (2 and 3 missing), the dummy puts down ♥Qxxx and 9 nondescript points, and third hand has ♥A10. What's the right play? If you play the ace, the queen could become the ninth trick. So he tries the ♥10. I win with my ♥ J, knock out LHO's entry and score 400 while cutting off their partial. The captain is not happy, as playing the \(\forall A\) and returning the ♥10 would work on this hand, since he could force out the queen, get in with his entry and cash two more hearts.

So LHO opens in second seat (not. vul vs. vul.) on  $\triangle$  Qxxx  $\checkmark$  Axxx  $\diamond$  x  $\triangle$  AJ9x and the captain checks for aces and goes right to 7NT. What can you do with that worthless hand. Seemingly, only protect the diamonds. Your 10 lead is covered by partner with the queen. Declarer wins and plays two high hearts. Partner throws a diamond on the second. So declarer has 5 heart tricks,  $\triangle$ A, surely  $\triangle$ KQ, and  $\triangle$ AKJ. But that's 13

tricks, and no claim. He proceeds to run the hearts. Partner throws another diamond\* and then, after thought, two clubs while you let go two diamonds. He now plays the ♠A and over to the ♠Q. You must throw all your diamonds as he takes two more spades. His last three cards are ♠Kx and ♠J. Partner has ♠Qx of clubs and ♠K. If you keep ♠10xx and play low, ten, you may beat the contract.

Of course, anyone could have bid seven of a major, but the captain so enjoys frustrating me as he scores up his triumph. On the fourth hand (all vul.), he opens 2 (strong) and we each hold very nearly the same hands. But this time, after some exchange, they take pity on us and stop at 4. Naturally, this time there is no squeeze, and they just make five.


Rubber bridge isn't for everyone. But nearly every week there is some high drama that is unavailable in any of the other forms that I have played.

As Long as It Gets You Where You Want to Go



My partner, the inestimable Robert S Brown, has an astounding memory. Really. So when we recently put NAMYATS on our card I had to assume he'd remember it, right? As I've been telling everyone for years, I trust my partner even if no one else does.



era, a sociable and mostly insect-inhabited planet somewhere in a distant galaxy. (I'll save for a future episode the story of how insects learned to play bridge.) Bob is sitting West.

Naturally, I alert Bob's opening 4♦ bid and my RHO, six legs and a lisp, I kid you not, asks me about it. "Transfer to spades, solid 7-card suit, stronger than a preempt." Of course, something must be out of the ordinary since in my solar system "solid" includes the king and I was pretty sure I could see that gentleman lurking just behind my right thumb. However, an agreement is an agreement and I dutifully bid 4♠.

At this point a normal West might have said to himself, "Holy Belladonna, I forgot about NAMYATS, my partner thinks I have a solid seven-card spade suit plus extras, I have to do something so let's bid 5\* and hope we get out of this on the cheap." But a player of Bob Brown's caliber is far from a normal West. In fact, Bob is far from a normal North, South, East, or anything else. A player of Bob Brown's caliber jumps to 6\*.

I never asked him to explain the so-called "thought process" behind the 6 bid because I was afraid if I knew it I might be tempted to use it. However, my best guess is that it went like this:

- I love my 9-card suit, even if it's missing 2 front teeth (the king and queen);
- We probably already have a bottom score, so if we are in for a penny let's go in for a pound;
- I have to make up for our bottom score on the previous deal, even though it was technically not totally my fault;
- If partner has a couple of aces, who knows, we might even make six diamonds.

Well, as you can surmise by now, North leads the ♠A and it is all over, with Bob's losing heart going on the good ♠K. Even an opening ♠K lead would not have beaten this sagacious contract, since obviously Bob would've been clever enough to win with the ♣A, unblock the ♠K, drop his losing spade on the ♣J, and later get rid of his losing heart on the ♣10. Fabulous bid, partner!

Of course, we don't want to go too far with this Brownis-a-genius business — quite a few of our competitors reached the same slam and made it. Sadly, we'll never know if any did so by using Bob's absolutely amazing feat of memory loss.

# **Ruminations**

## by Robert S Brown

The pairing patterns of Bridge players are not mere stochastic variables. Remarkably, these duads of kaleidoscopic mutability have not received the rigorous sociological,



psychological, and biological analyses they richly deserve. The Ruminator is venturing into this void — not with any hope of providing definitive insights, but only to adumbrate areas of inquiry for elucidation by more diligent researchers.

# **EMPIRICAL DATABASE**

For this Article, all CBC games played during the calendar years 2009-2014 (the "Time Frame") were analyzed.<sup>2</sup> During the Time Frame, 68,640 "Raw

Pairings" occurred at the Club. This includes Swiss and Knock-Out teams counted as two pairs each totaling 5040 pairs. Eliminating these teams left 63,600 "Pure Pairs" whose evolutionary permutations are discussed *infra*. Among the Pure Pairs were 516 "New Players" of particular interest. Unfortunately, of this number only 183 were deemed "Longitudinally Significant" for this study. 4

# **STASIS STATISTICS**

Excluding New Players from the Pure Pairs database is heuristically assumed to generate a pair population with stabilized pairing patterns (the "Stasis Pairs").<sup>5</sup> The Stasis Pairs during the Time Frame totaled 58,551 (63,600 Pure Pairs less 4941 New Player appearances). The Stasis Player Population is predominately females who play 5% more games per year than their male counterparts:

### **NEW PLAYER STATISTICS**

New Players differ remarkably from the Stasis population in the number of different partners they have in a given year (ranging from 1.8 in their first year to 5.7 in their fifth year). Their primary partner is of the same sex in 80% of the pairs studied. Fidelity to that partner decreases steadily over time. 7

Hours played per week ("HPW") by New Players advance over time in perfect congruence to the average crack cocaine consumption pattern found among new addicts<sup>8</sup> - increasing steadily for twenty seven weeks to a maintenance level reflecting time, tolerance, and financial resources. Although some medications can reduce drug dependence none have yet been found with similar efficacy for bridge addiction.

### **CONCLUSION**

The cultural anthropologists who have reviewed this data so far are divided on its significance. Some deem it merely a reflection of aging population demographics while others suggest more profound implications

# **Measuring Your Performance**

"When I bowled, no one ever asked me what the total number of pins I knocked down was, but a lot of bowlers wanted to know what my average was. Master Points is the total number of pins. Power Ratings is the bowling average." - Chris Champion

The system of tallying Masterpoints was created in 1936 by William McKenney – they tell how well you did at a tournament, or over your Bridge career. They are not a measure of how well you play the game today. Your Power rating is.

What is wrong with the Master Point rating system? Every time you play, your rating goes up or it stays the same, no matter how poorly you do. Master Points measures 4 attributes simultaneously:

- (1) A bridge player's expertise
- (2) A bridge player's partner's expertise
- (3) A bridge player's opponent's expertise
- (4) How many ACBL sanctioned games a bridge player has competed in.

The creation of Masterpoints is regarded as one of the best examples of excellent marketing by ACBL. In 1936, Masterpoints became both a rating system and an awards system by default. Many members felt that bridge players would object to seeing their rating go down. In 1975, the first flighted event was held. When the first flighted event was played, a few players realized that if they had fewer Masterpoints, they could play in lower flight. In 1985 the first Stratified event was played using Masterpoints for stratification, once again to gain numbers in the games. Finally in 1995 the first bracketed KO was created. Masterpoints became a weaker indicator of playing ability. Master Point Rating system is a great system for awarding exceptional play, but a poor rating system. Power Ratings is a rating system based on a bridge player's ability today. Power ratings measures just one attribute of each player -- his or her expertise at the bridge table. It looks only at a bridge player's average

game percentage over the last two years; the number

of games played is not considered. It calculates the player's opponent's average rating for each and every game as well, and the player's game percentage is adjusted up or down according to how much the opponents are above or below average. This eliminates the opponent's expertise. This system also subtracts the partner's rating from the player's game percentage. This eliminates the partner's expertise. The remaining percentage is the bridge player's expertise, or "Power Rating".

Power Rating (PR) is your average game % when you are your own partner (or your partner has exactly the same bridge ability/skill as you) and you compete against average players (PR = 50). . A PR may or may not be a measure of your bridge ability or level of expertise but it is always a measure of your average level of play. Every match point game you play has a final game percentage. The game % for each game is a combination of your game % and your partner's game %. If you and your partner are equally strong, your game % is ½. Otherwise the game % is split in proportion to your and your partner's strength, the stronger partner getting the larger share. All of your game %'s during the past 24 months are averaged to give you ½ of your PR.

Since your PR is your average game % against average competition, your actual average game % is adjusted to show what it would be against average competition. DOD is this adjustment. To calculate degree of difficulty, add up the PR's for all of your competitors (the players sitting your direction in your section and other sections if scoring across the field) during the past 24 months and divide by the total number of competitors. Subtract 50 from this result to find your degree of difficulty (DOD). Let's say that your average competitor has a PR of 52, and you and your average partner have an average game percentage of 51%. You must be a little better than your competition that has a PR of 52. So add your DOD, 2, to your average game percentage, 51, to get a PR of 53 for you and your average partner.

Your adjusted average game % is a combination of ½ of your PR (Self) and ½ of your average partner's PR (Part). If you play 10 games with Partner A, 100 games with partner B and 1 game with partner C, multiply A's PR by 10, B's PR by 100, and C's PR by 1. Add these results together and divide by 111 to get your average partner's PR.

This is the formula used to prove that the correct Power Ratings have been found: (Self PR + Part PR)/2= Game % + DOD. So if you have a 60% game in a field where degree of difficulty is 3%, then the combined PR

is 63% to be shared between you and your partner. Since partner's PR is 50% and your PR is 55%, your average rating is (50+55)/2=52.5. So you get proportionately more of the spoils — you get a whopping (63%\*55/52.5) = 66% PR rating and your partner gets (63%\*50/52.5) = 60% PR. And you deserve it. You played with a weaker partner, and had a good game in a tough field.

Lucky and unlucky games, with occasional partners, can distort a player's PR, especially when a player plays more than 2/3's of his games with the same partner. The two partners PR's will fluctuate up and down in opposite directions of each other. To minimize this, all of each player's PR's during the past 24 months are averaged. The actual (top) PR is this average. The (bottom) average of the SELF column is ½ of the current month's calculated PR. To become a rated player you need 12 games with other rated players. 11 of those games need to be with rated players other than your favorite rated partner, the rated partner you play the most games with. The only way to become a rated player with only 12 games is to play one game with each of 12 different rated players.

Power ratings assume that everyone has an average level of play and over the long run their scores reflect that average level of play. But this is real world. Some players make more mistakes with some partners than with others. Power ratings cannot tell if your partner is making more mistakes, you are making more mistakes, or a combination of both. I doubt that any rating system, including Master Points, and Lehman Ratings which are found on OKBridge, will ever figure that one out. When power ratings see bad results, it assigns lower ratings to both partners. You can see where this is happening by looking at your personal summary on Power ratings home page. From www.cincybridge.com, select Unit 124 Power ratings. from the Power rating home page (http://www.coloradospringsbridge.com/ under "Unit Power Ratings" select Other Unite and then Unit 124 Cincinnati. Then find your name in the yellow box at the top of the page. If your name is not listed, send an email to ckchampion@netzero.net to get your name added and you will receive a personal summary of your history (it's very informative).

DISCLAIMER: I have rewritten and paraphrased a number of descriptions of the system from Chris Champion's web site.

Here are some interesting stats from the Power ratings home page for our unit. These players have a "level of play" that is higher than the top of their stratification. What this means is, that while on the Masterpoint chart, they maybe in strat B, they play like strat A players.


