### FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK



Happy New Year everyone! The New Year is the time for resolutions, fresh starts, hopes and dreams. So be it this year, with a dash of prudence. I wish you all the best for the New Year and look forward to seeing you at our club games and tournaments.

Northern Kentucky and games at the Cincinnati Bridge Center are open for business! We are rooting for Anderson to solve its space needs so that they can get their game back up and running soon.

While we've seen the upsurge in Omicron deflate some of the progress we'd made, there are signs that the current surge will dissipate quickly and that we can resume playing bridge with confidence. Some of us have found delight in playing online – that's great. Some of us really want to get back to playing in person. We want to see everyone enjoying this game to the fullest.

The Unit Board has developed a Covid Exposure Protocol for players and directors to assure both transparent timely communication and appropriate privacy. See the CBA Website at

for details. Clubs will notify exposed players and will decide whether to close after a known exposure. We ask all members who are exposed to follow the CDC Guidelines found at:

What you should do depends on your vaccination status. All games at the CBC require proof of full vaccination.

The ACBL has seen fit to require both full vaccination and wearing masks when playing in an ACBL sanctioned tournament. They defer to clubs for club games. Not all clubs require the same conditions. Please follow your club

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requirements and also the CDC guidelines if you were to be exposed to Covid-19.

THANK YOU – CBC PLAYERS! Our members stood up and offered support for the difficult year that was 2021. Thanks to their generosity the Unit was able to defray \$10,620 of operating costs for 2021. The financial report for 2021 will be available in early March after the Board of Directors review. We thank our members and we will work hard with our club owner tenants to ensure the CBC remains viable.

Our financial situation is very simple. When we get back to 400 tables each month, the CBC will break even at the current rent we charge club owners. If we get back to only 300 tables each month, a \$4 per table increase in rent will cover our operating costs. As of December 2021, the CBC enjoyed 209.5 tables. We are encouraged as this was an important and steady improvement from just 55 tables when we reopened in May 2021.

Just as club attendance has taken as step back with Omicron, so has tournament attendance around the country. Recent regionals are seeing 30-40% of their pre-

covid tables. Our Cincinnati Flying Pig Regional will happen in June 2022. We are hopeful that many will attend.

With the New Year comes new leaders to your Board of Directors. Joining us for the first time are Bert Luken, John Altman Jr. and Robert Lail. Michelle Barker continues as our Vice President, Pam Campbell as our Treasurer, and Tom Mess is our Secretary. Let us know what's important to you.

We have a large debt of thanks to offer members who are leaving the Board of Directors this year - 2021 President Potter Orr has been instrumental in bringing technology to the Unit, and bringing the Unit kicking and screaming into the internet. We all appreciate his wisdom, leadership and contributions to our game. Mehalko reprised her role on the Board (one of our past presidents) with flair and wisdom, and helped us manage the awards ceremonies. Mike Burns led our Membership Committee in 2021 and has developed a following with his weekly rendition of the Bob Jones Quiz that shows up in the Monday Cincinnati Enquirer. Potter, Brenda, and Mike - the Board of Directors thank you all for all you do for Unit 124 and for making bridge fun in Unit 124. We will continue to seek out your ideas to make bridge better for us all.

And that's our focus. The Unit Board has set 3 priorities for 2022:

- Increase in-person bridge play within the Unit;
- Increase CBA membership;
- Make bridge fun

We'd like your help.

If a member of the Board of Directors or our Membership Committee calls you, please give them your time and the benefit of your wisdom. We want to know what would make playing at the clubs more attractive for you.

If you have recently dropped your membership in the ACBL, we want you back. Tell us what we can do to make ACBL membership a good value for you. If you don't find bridge fun anymore, tell us why not. Maybe there's a way we can help.

John Williams is our Membership Chair. He is forming his committee of motivated members now and will be working to help attract you back to the table. Please give his team your time.

District 11 plans monthly STaC games for SILVER POINTS and extra rewards for in-person club games. Join us as often as you can. There is a new STaC Tournament being offered only during the first quarter of 2022 for in-person play. The Royal STaC will likely happen in the Month of April for us — it offers GOLD/RED/SILVER/and BLACK points in equal measure. What an opportunity to enhance your bridge journey by playing at your local club! Please encourage your local club games to participate in all upcoming STaCs.

My challenge to us all is simple – let's put FUN back in bridge and people back in bridge clubs.

I look forward to seeing all of you at the tables in the coming weeks. Stay healthy, stay safe, and play lots of bridge!

### **ONE STEP FORWARD**

We have a new year and a new issue for all our members to enjoy. Matt Granovetter informs us of an upcoming online charity event in support of the Yeshiva School in Cincinnati. We have a delightful contribution from Rob Weidenfeld. Dean Congbalay continues his commentary on bridge PLAYERS. There are updates from our clubs, news of National and International import, and discussions about ACBL membership and Unit 124 finances for those so inclined.

I have been around the bridge community in Cincinnati for almost 45 years and I have never seen a harder working group of club managers and board members than we have now. Collaboration is the key. Everyone knows the situation we face together and by pulling together we all expect to come out with an attractive future. No, the game of bridge will not be the same as it was before Covid-19 struck in March 2020, but we will have a thriving community and interesting games that offer fun for players of all levels as long as we pull together.

There's no doubt that online bridge is here to stay. I doubt that online bridge will displace in-person bridge especially for high level tournaments until many security issues are resolved. There is also a vast difference in the social enjoyment offered by watching a computer screen for 2 hours compared to meeting friends, sharing snacks and

coffee, catching up on new stories, and playing cards. No virtual world will replace that.

The key question we face is how do we cause online and in-person bridge to build on each other so that both grow and provide fun for our players and the right returns to their owners. Many teachers are finding that teaching online not only improves the learning experience for their students, it allows them to offer better focused instruction across much larger class sizes. Having learned to play online the question is how to introduce these new players to in-person bridge at the local club. The best minds of the ACBL are working on this issue. While it's easy to see current debate between online game owners and in-person game owners as a mark of division, finding the common ground of mutual growth is not only possible it's just best. And it's hard work. This is not a question of "either or"; it's a question of how to do "AND".

Cincinnati players have had the luxury of clubs with dedicated spaces (or a close approximation) for a very long time. When I first came here in 1976 bridge was played in basements of banks and restaurants and in churches and schools. The advent of a shared space dedicated to bridge brought great joy to players and club owners.

The Cincinnati Bridge Center is a Unit-leased 5600 square foot space that can serve up to some 50 tables. The CBC is a jewel among the bridge centers in the District, comparable to venues in Lexington, Louisville, and Dayton. NKBC has a fine space in Elsmere in the Lion's Club. Anderson is still in search of space for their club – losing space can be hard to replace.

Our game price is low compared to peer cities. St. Louis is a similar city in size and economy. They have a similar sized bridge center with similar table counts and charge \$10 per person compare to \$8 at the CBC. The Glen Rock Bridge Club in NJ had a similar venue to ours and charged \$15 per person. Prices in major metro areas can range from \$15 up. Honors Club in NYC charges \$33 per person for a club game (lunch included).

Having a dedicated facility means:

- Tables and chairs are always available and in place for a game
- 2) Bidding boxes and scoring device are readily available.
- 3) Score sheets and game summaries are on hand.
- 4) Coffee machines, softened water and a refrigerator
- 5) Food serving area for snacks and parties.

- 6) Dealing machines to duplicate the hands for every game.
- 7) Printers for hand records and game announcements.
- 8) Computers to run the machines and run, score and report the games.
- 9) Storage space for equipment used for duplicate games.
- 10) The space is always clean and maintained professionally.
- 11) Parking is convenient and free (unless demand to play is exceptionally high).
- 12) Games are easy to reach from I-75 all times of day.
- 13) Trophies, awards, and plaques have a permanent home where all members can see them.
- 14) Club owners can focus their efforts on promoting their game and not on working to set up, tear down and store equipment after each session.

We believe an attractive space is an important part of enjoying duplicate bridge. We are blessed to have at least two (and hopefully three) venues in Cincinnati where we enjoy these benefits.

One goal we have is to encourage our NLM community to show up and support our in-person games proportional to their numbers. NLMs are 61% of our Unit. We would like to see NLMs be 61% of our tables at limited and open games. What would it take to make that happen? That's the question we need you to answer. That answer will mean we have met all three objectives identified by the Board of Directors. Your bid.




We have been playing since early May and our games continue to grow!

The First Annual Pro-Am Tournament was held March 7, 2021 and raised \$12,000.

The best bidding award last year went to John McAllister and Zia on board 19, where they were only one of two pairs to stop in game on this mirror hand. Usually bridge players talk about how to reach a slam, but this hand was all about how to stay out of slam.

The auction began with Jacoby 2NT and a natural rebid of 3♦. Then a series of system bids followed:

(1) 3♥ was a relay to ask partner if he had a singleton (2) 3NT was the second step. The method was: step one for 5422 shape, step 2 singleton low and step 2 singleton high. So, John showed shortness in ♣s. At this point, Zia admits he lost confidence in John's remembering the system, LOL.

(3) 4 was a cuebid by Zia, designed to keep the ball rolling in case John had indeed forgotten, else elicit a diamond cuebid.

(4) 4♥ was a heart cuebid, denying the DA or DK.

(5) 4♠ was a signoff, as it appeared to Zia that if the partnership was on the same wavelength they were missing the ♦K and the ♣A.

(6) Pass of 4♠ showed exceptional trust. Only one other pair stopped in game on this hand, because only one other North was willing to quit.

John and Zia scored 95.5% sharing a tie for top with the other pair that stayed out of slam: my wife Pamela and her partner Sandy Orr. BTW, Pamela and Sandy won the award for the best defense.



### THIS HAND SWINGS BOTH WAYS





It may seem to my friends in the bridge world that I have an on again, off again relationship with bridge. Often you see me and often you don't. As they say in sunny Havana, "asi es la vida" or "such is life."

Yes, life gets in the way of something as important as pursuing your favorite pastime, in this case bridge. I grew up in NJ and there were plenty of local bridge clubs and instructors. I learned bridge and played at the age of 12. But when I went to rural Ohio for college, there were no

bridge clubs around. All I could do was read bridge books which I did. Twelve years later I moved to Cincinnati. I told friends I wanted a more cosmopolitan area, but certainly two other strong factors were many Chinese restaurants and duplicate bridge! It took me five years to become a LM in 1983, but it didn't stop me from studying. In 1986 Life happened again. Relationships and a master's degree kept me away for another ten years, but I still loved to read about bridge. All these years later and once again Covid cut down my social life and my bridge playing. But to the rescue was online bridge and finally I am back.

One thing hasn't changed for me over the years is my propensity to perseverate over a particular hand I have played. Usually, it is a hand in which I have made a terrible mistake-those dreams seemingly last forever. But on occasion, one hand fascinates me in which I played a positive role. This column features that hand. It was played on an online team match last month. Here is the entire hand:



to realize that while I had a minimal fit and only 14 points, I had a singleton, honor doubleton in my partner's suit, and 3 quick tricks that might cover all of his minor suit losers. So, I bid 4♥. My LHO, perhaps suspecting I had a bigger fit (giving his partner more ♠s), bid 4 of his great suit. When it came back to me, I realized that my hand was good for my partner who bid 2♥, it was even better for defense. I said double. Here is how it went on the lead of the ♣7.

Tr.1: When partner preempts and leads an outside suit, it is almost always a singleton. So, I won and led back the ♣4, asking him to lead back the lower ranking suit, ♦s.

Tr. 2: He ruffed the ♣ and led back the ♦ trey.


Tr. 3: I won the •K (showing him I also had the ace)

Tr. 4: I led back my ♣5 which he ruffed with the trump 9.

Tr. 5: ♦6 to ♦K.

Tr. 6 At this point, declarer can't have any ♥s (look at dummy) or ♣s. If he is out of ♦s then your partner is out of trumps. So, you hope he has one more ♦. If so, partner has one more trump and you hope it is the king. Even if it the queen or jack it still might work to lead another ♣ as declarer might ruff low. So, you lead a fourth ♣ and declarer is stuck. If he ruffs with the A, your partner's K is promoted to a trick. If he ruffs lower, you partner can overruff for your fifth trick. It works out exactly that way and you are plus 500.

At the other table our partners were down in 4♥ but we still gained 10 imps. Luckily the other side didn't double. Looking at the trump holding and the ♣KQ9x on the outside, many would have been tempted. But should our partners have been down in that 4♥? No, they should not have been. For convenience, here are the hands:



Tr. 1: On lead against 4♥, E leads the ♣K, won by the ♣A.

Tr. 2: Declarer has no idea about distribution, but knows this. He will never set up either of the dummy's suits. The club ace was an entry to the long ◆s but that is now gone. Even if trumps are 3-2, and the ◆Q falls under the AK, your vs are hopelessly blocked...with no entry to cash them. So, you have to find another way out. Might as well try to ruff ◆s in dummy, as much as you hate having to use the ▼K to ruff. Well, you have no choice. You lead your singleton ◆ and are happy to see West rise with the ◆A.

Tr. 3: He then plays the ♣J which really surprises as you would think that he would try to lead trumps to cut down the ruffing of ♠s in the dummy. Is it possible he doesn't have any? You ruff with the deuce of trumps and keep that thought in the back of your mind.


Tr. 4: You have no meaningful pitch so you save your ♠K for later and lead the ♠9. All follow as you ruff with the ♥ trey.

Tr.5,6: You don't want anyone pitching a ♦ while you are crossing so you cash the ♦A and ♦K, happily noting the fall of the ♦Q.

Tr.7: Now you lead the third ♣ and all follow. What do you know so far? East started with 2 ♦s and at least two ♠s. She must have the fourth ♣ as she led the ♣K and only the ♣Q is missing. All you know at this point is that she has 5 cards in the majors left.

Tr. 8: Fully expecting the ♠s to be reasonably divided, you try to cash the ♠K. Much to your surprise, East ruffs with the 4. So, you think, my goodness she only has two ♠s, therefore she has all of the missing ♥s! The good news is she only has one trick so far.

Tr. 9: You ruff another ♣ leaving her with only her 4 ♥s. Here is the final position with you needing two more tricks. South and West are immaterial in the endgame. You are in your hand.



If you lead anything but the ♥A and another ♥, you get two tricks. Any other card you play will give you two tricks. Congratulations from both ends of the table!



### **Bidding Quiz - Answers**

Q1 – Neither vulnerable ♠ K T 8 ♥ A 3 ♦ Q 7 5 4 ♣ Q J T 3



Bob Jones <u>Pass</u> You have the right shape, but this hand is not good enough to act at the three level. Pass.


Bob Fisk <u>Pass</u> Make sure you do this slowly while glaring at your RHO. That way partner can balance with 3NT holding a 13 count and a singleton small Spade. Heh.

Joe Muenks <u>Pass</u> Epls. Pass in rhythm. You'll score fine if partner acts or if they can't. If she doubles, you'll chance 3NT.

Steve Vogel <u>Pass</u> Partner has to have at least as good a hand as mine to make game somewhere, and if he/she has that hand, partner will strive to balance.

Steve Moese <u>Pass</u> Preempts often work. This hand is way too off shape for a double and too weak for 3NT. Partner still has a chance to express some values. Let's see what they have to say.

Q 2 – North-South vulnerable ♠ K J T 9 3 ♥ A Q ♦ 5 4 ♣ A J T 7




Bob Jones  $\underline{4*}$  You want to accept the invitation, but partner is unlimited. Why not show him something on the way to 4\*? Bid 4\*.

Bob Fisk <u>4♣</u> Partner is unlimited, and you're about at the maximum for your overcall. If partner plays along with a 4♠ control bid, axe for keycards. Picture partner with Qxxx xxx AKxx Kx.

Joe Muenks <u>4♣</u> Partner is unlimited and I have a fabulous hand, so I'll cue my cheapest ace (and continue assisting with 4♥ if I hear 4♦ next).

Steve Vogel 4♣ If I bid 3NT, I am concerned that might end the auction, and with partner being unlimited, I do not want us to give up on slam just yet. If partner responds 4♠, I will rebid 4♥ to see if partner has more in the tank. If partner, instead, responds 4♠, I will pass. Steve Moese 3NT 3NT is almost automatic. We show our NT stop(s) and let partner direct the auction. By showing values in their suit partner might temper any thoughts of a 12 or 13 trick contract they might have been wishing. 4♣ here would deny the robust Heart holding we have and biggest instead values in diamonds we do not have. Let's not mislead partner.





Bob Jones 2♥ In Charles Goren's day, a 2♥ bid here would show extras. Most modern experts don't play it that way, and neither do we. Bid 2♥.

Bob Fisk 2 Partner's 2 bid didn't deny a 4-card major. If partner doesn't have four Hearts, partner will most likely bid some amount of the notrumps (yay, we have no tenace positions to protect!).


Joe Muenks 2 Playing standard or 2/1, bid your longest suit first with the values to do so. Here partner may very well have 5♣ and 4♥, so continue the search for an 8 card major. You show no extra values or extra length in diamonds as partner forced the 2 level, not you. You want partner declaring NT if it comes to that so they can receive the spade lead, too.

Steve Vogel 2 № Partner's 2 ♣ bid does not deny a 4-card major, so my appropriate rebid is to show a 4-card major if I have one. A 2NT rebid by me would deny a 4-card major.

Steve Moese 2 In modern bidding 2♣ can be GF, or GF unless rebidding 3♣. In either case we bid 2♥ - this is not a strength showing reverse but a 4-card suit. Partner will bid 2♣ with a 4-card major to first establish a Game Force. We find the 4-4- major fit in the second round of bidding. The 2♥ bid also tells the table that we might not have values in spades for 3NT. Partner will bid accordingly.







Bob Jones  $1 \frac{1}{2}$  This hand is worth an opening bid. We always open our longest suit unless the two suits are touching. Open  $1 \frac{1}{2}$ .

Bob Fisk 1 ven I'm not cray-cray enough to reverse with this hand, although I wouldn't fault someone that did. Open 1 vent and rebid 2 vent (i.e., pretend you're 5-5).


Joe Muenks 1 de l'm normally a staunch adherent to the rule of 20/22, but a stretch is needed for 6-5 hands, so I'll open without my 2 defensive tricks. Further, in expert partnerships I play that 3 ver over a 1 de or 1NT reply shows 6/5 or 7/5 and a weak-ish hand. (I do not know the name of it, but it is pretty common in flight A.) Playing standard I'll bid 2 next.

Steve Vogel 1 First issue- is this hand worth an opening bid? With 6/5 distribution, 10 HCP (all in my long suits) and decent intermediates, I view this hand as worth an opening bid. Some might choose to open 1♣ planning to reverse into hearts. I believe that such bidding would show a hand with more high-card strength, and I would worry that my hearts may get shut out by the opponents' spade bids. With this holding, I think it is best to get my major suit into the bidding as soon as possible.

Steve Moese 1 degree I can understand 1 (many prefer bidding 1 M on 5 M=6 m hands when weak). I'm old fashioned. Here I intend to rebid hearts twice. Partner might assume I have a much stronger (HCP) hand after the first heart rebid, but after the second they will know

my 5-loser or better hand is based on 5=6 shape or BETTER.

Aside - a popular treatment in Cincinnati is to use the "Jump Reverse" to show this hand. So the auction would be 1♣ - 1Any - 3♥. That's fine if you like that, but I much prefer the jump reverse to show a splinter raise of responder's suit. So I would have a hand like: KQxx x KQx AKxxx in the auction 1♣ - 1♠ - 3♥ where 3♥ shows a singleton or void in hearts and 4- card spade support.



Bob Jones <u>1NT</u> Charles Goren would not have even considered opening 1NT. Modern experts do it routinely. We like it! Open 1NT.

Bob Fisk <u>1</u> ◆ Opening this 1NT seems like an unnecessary distortion. Open 1 ◆ and then rebid 3 ◆. Bridge is easy!


Joe Muenks 1NT I do not encourage opening this 1NT, but it is what I'd do at the table (and the question is worded "what call would you make," not "what call should you make" ⑤). If you open 1♦, jump to 3♦ next and hope it doesn't turn out poorly.

Steve Vogel 1 delta If my hand were instead Kx Kx Qxxxxx AKx, I would open 1NT. With this holding, my plan is to open 1 delta and reluctantly rebid 3 delta over partner's expected 1 of a major response. I say "reluctantly" because I would like the diamond suit to be a bit stronger (say, replace one of the diamond spots with the 10).

Steve Moese 1 thas become fashionable to put all sorts of hands in the opening 1NT (15-17) bid. This isn't one of them. Here we lack stops in spades and diamonds need help. The best way to find out is to open 1 and rebid 3 .

Q 6 – East-West vulnerable ♠ A Q 7 6 4 3 ♥ K T 5 ♦ A 3 ♣ K 5

Bob Jones 1♠ The main difference between this hand and the hand in Q5 is that the six-card suit is a major.

Open 1♠, just like Charles Goren would have.

Bob Fisk  $1 \pm 2$  Why is this question in here?

Joe Muenks 1♠ Epls. I'm unsure what any other reasonable option might be, so I hope we have a near unanimous response.

Steve Vogel 1 <u>♣</u> 16 HCP and extras for spade length-I would value this hand at around 18 points. I see no reason to consider any other opening bid.

Steve Moese  $1 \triangleq$  See Question 5. This hand opens  $1 \triangleq$  and rebids  $3 \triangleq$  over 1NT. If partner makes a GF, we simply show the sixth spade as cheaply as possible.
