## WE NEED DIRECTORS - Free director class at the Cincinnati Bridge Center

As you may already know, the Cincinnati Bridge Center is in need of a fresh crop of new directors and club managers. The Cincinnati bridge community is soon going to be losing one of our most important assets and ambassadors to the game, Pam Campbell. Despite all of our best efforts, we could not prevent her from answering the siren's call to Florida. If you don't already know, Pam has almost single-handedly been the driving force behind Cincinnati's post-pandemic return to face-to-face bridge. At her peak, Pam had been running almost $80 \%$ of the club games at the Cincinnati Bridge Center. This includes at least one game per day every Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday. While no one will be able to completely fill Pam's shoes, we are in dire need of the next generation of directors, sanction holders, and club managers to help maintain and grow face-to-face bridge in Cincinnati.

Now I am intimately familiar with the fact that trying to run a club game can seem intimidating or stressful. Back when I first became a director at the ripe age of 15 , I was pretty much immediately thrown into the fire directing the old Tuesday night open game which was full of the club's best players. While I was absolutely terrified at the time, I learned that it really wasn't as intimidating or confusing as I initially thought and as proof of that I am still here directing games 12 years later. Even now, with my experience as a director I still make mistakes. My Monday night crowd can certainly attest to this as there was even one night that I had to break out the old paper scoring slips because I somehow managed to mess up the movement so bad in ACBLScore. While it certainly took me a little more effort to manually enter scores, everybody still had a good time, especially those who got to reminisce of time before we had to feverishly press the accept button on the BridgeMate fifteen time before it submits the score. The moral of this story is that short of you unplugging the computer, taking it outside and running it over with your car, there is always a way to fix any issue or mistake that comes up and provide a good game of bridge to the community.

In order to help train this next generation of directors at the Cincinnati Bridge Center, I will be offering a FREE director class at the end of August. There will be a total of four sessions split over two Saturdays. The purpose of this class will not be to overload people with enough information to become tournament directors. Rather this class is designed to equip new directors with the base knowledge and tools to be able successfully run a club game. The first half of the class will be devoted to teaching you the rules of the game with a focus on those rules that actually come up frequently in club games. The second half of the class will focus on how to actually run a club game at the Cincinnati Bridge Center. We will talk about making boards, setting up the game, and most importantly how to unravel and demystify the horror show that is ACBLScore. By the time the class is over, you will have all the tools necessary to be able to run your very own club game at the Cincinnati Bridge Center.

In addition to the class, I will be making my Monday night bridge game open to any new directors who want to give their new skills a test drive. New directors who are interested will be welcome to direct a Monday night game or two with me so that you can build the confidence to run your own games while having someone close by to work with and ask questions.

As a final word, I want to make it clear that there are no real experience requirements to become a director. If you have a basic understanding of the game of duplicate bridge and can operate a mouse and keyboard, you have the requisite skills to run your very own game.

## NORTH AMERICAN PAIRS

June-July-August Those of you who have Qualifying Games
at Participating
Clubs near You participated in this largest grass roots pair tournament know the excitement. I want to call out the benefits for our newer players who might not be aware or who might even feel intimidated about the prospect of playing in a District Final let alone traveling to an NABC tournament to participate in an NABC Final.

## Cost:

Every club runs NAP Qualifying games twice a month during June, July, and August. These games cost \$1 extra per person, and those funds go to subsidize stipends and grass roots budgets for Units to support the NAP and GNT.

## How it Works:

You must finish above $50 \%$ or in the top half of your stratification (assuming the stratifications match NAP criteria). Players qualify as individuals and play according
to the MP holding they have as of May 6, 2022. Masterpoint won aafter that date do not count toward your stratification.

## Benefits

NAPQ Games - earn 3x masterpoints $1 / 2$ black and $1 / 2$ red. Qualify as many times as you like with as many partners as you want.

Once qualified plan to play in the D11 Finals - Sat Oct 15 for Flight B (<2500 MPs) and Sunday For Flight C (<500 MPs/NLM) and Flight A (Open).

The finals pay GOLD and RED Points at Regional Rating. That's right - Losts of GOLD Points available.

Play the D11 finals at the Cincinnati Bridge Center - that makes this a home tournament for all Unit 124 members.

If you finish in the top 4 places at the D11 Finals you qualify for the NABC finals in New Orleans LA in March 2023. You also receive a stipend:

| Place/Flight | Subsidy |

| 1st Place, A/B/C | $\$ 700$ per individual from the ACBL |
| 2nd Place, $A / B / C$ | $\$ 300$ per individual from the ACBL |
| 3rd Place, A/B/C | $\$ 200$ per individual from District 11 |
| 4th Place, B/C | $\$ 150$ per individual from District 11 |

Proof of participation required for D11 subsidies. ACBL subsidy paid on site with participation.

Please give serious consideration to qualifying for the NAP District Finals. You will have the chance to earn red and gold points at the CBC and perhaps have a chance at earning a travel stipend to attend the NABC in New Orleans. You are under no obligation to attend New Orleans. However, who wouldn't jump at the chance?

Table counts are the best measure of attendance in bridge. Four people playing in one session are a table. If the same four people play in 2 sessions, that's 2 tables.

## A Guy Collapsed at Bridge...

A guy collapsed at bridge today, and it has really gotten me thinking.

We were two-thirds the way through the game when I heard another player say that someone was on the floor toward the back of the room.

I got up from Table 9. A retired doctor was already at his side, elevating the 82 -year-old man's legs onto a chair.

I called 911. He seemed to be in good spirits and was even smiling -- a rarity for a bridge player! A paramedic voiced that perhaps he was dehydrated. Firefighters placed him on a stretcher and took him to Lakewood Ranch Hospital.

I'm still thinking about the incident.
Before he was taken away, he shared that he lives alone. I asked him if there was anyone he would like us to contact. He asked us to call his son up in New England. His son would then alert his daughter in Denmark.

The guy lives alone. So do I.
If something were to happen to me, I wouldn't have any family nearby either.

Last summer, a very good friend fell in a parking lot. An employee at his building called me, and I went there immediately. He would have been my emergency contact -- but he passed away this spring.

It all makes you think...
A couple months ago, I had my yearly physical. Dr. Oppenheimer told me that I'm due for a routine colonoscopy. He referred a gastro guy here, but I decided to get the procedure done in Columbus, where my mom could take me.

Yes, I could use his referral, but who would drive me? I know that I could ask a neighbor, but that's an hours-long commitment. It just doesn't feel comfortable.

As I was standing at the bridge center waiting on the paramedics today, my buddy Paul looked at me. He's a good egg, and something tells me that he read my mind.
"I would take you anywhere you needed to go if you needed me," he said. I know his words were genuine. I'd do the same for him.

* We have no idea how many tables we lost due to the power outage, but we still eeked out $45 \%$ of the 2019 table count. Before the tournament. I said I would have been ecstatic to reach $50 \%$, so I think we can consider it a huge success.

The future is in good hands with Arun at the helm, and I'll be around and available for advice and information. You will certainly take the Flying Pig in a different direction, and I'm excited to see where it goes. Good luck!

## Tables, Clubs, Players, Members

## By Steve Moese

This comes from the July 17, 2022 Advisory Council/ACBL Membership meeting and Management's report. Let's take a close look at the ACBL market for club bridge. How have things changed since 2019 (pre-Covid)?

Current share of tables for in-person bridge has grown since March form $\mathbf{1 2 . 5 \%}$ to about 19.5\%, however this is far less than pre-Covid shares. Pre- covid, the table counts were 2:1 In-person to face to face. Post-covid they are now 5:1 in favor of online bridge. We have asked management to repurpose Support Your Club Games to compete on PRICE with "Clear Point" BBO games so that a revenue stream appears for clubs struggling to reopen.

Face-to-Face clubs (excluding Unit sanctions for special Unit events) are only at 52\% of pre-covid levels.

## Member Participation In-Person Bridge

Members playing in F2F bridge now number about $80,000 / \mathrm{mo}$. vs $110,000 / \mathrm{mo}$. in 2019, down about 30.000, but up from March 2022 when only 50K were playing monthly. We need all players to return to in-person bridge.

## ACBL Membership Trends

Membership at 138,328 is down 8,471 (-5.8\%) versus 1 year ago. Not include over 3000 Guest Members since 2020 of which 468 are active. 1,241 have converted to membership.

We can talk about membership change from two sources - recruitment and existing member retention. Data shows retention losses have begun to subside. However, since many clubs have closed or moved to online play, we are seeing the pipeline for new members drying up.

We can use the ACBL monthly In/Out reports that document changes in membership to highlight the trends over the years. We focus on year end membership data. In 2020 with the onset of the pandemic we see member retention losses skyrocket to levels more than 50\% above recent history. Initial focus by Marketing was to stanch those losses and entice current members to remain members. Marketing Strategy 101 - it is much easier to
get a current member to return than it is to create a new member.

As the pandemic wore on and online bridge took hold, people began returning to their lives. They did not return to in-person bridge. Unfortunately, the loss of in-person clubs ( $-48 \%$ ) correlates well with the low of new recruits compared to historical levels.

The ACBL and the Education Foundation are collaborating on a recruitment program pilot where some 75 teachers (and clubs) with proven recruitment achievement will receive additional support to prove they can turn recruitment around at in-person classes and clubs. The pilot will be expanded if successful, and what the ACBL learns about recruitment will be available to all clubs and teachers. The ACBL will provide additional social media advertising support for pilot introductory programs.

Teachers have found that teaching classes online allows them to vastly expand their reach and, using technology like Shark Bridge, provide individual attention in a selfdirected learning environment that students prefer.

What's missing is the BRIDGE to in-person clubs from online teaching and play. That's the immediate focus. Note that BBO has no interest in supporting in-person play.

## What Are the Odds?

## By Steve Moese

(Derived from a 2017 lecture on probability).
As bridge players grow our skills, we notice that many of our choices can be improved by attention to the odds of success. Probability is at once fascinating and off-putting. Fascinating because understanding probabilities and how to calculate them offers great reward when we get it right. Off-putting because the theory and equations for many calculations are complex and difficult if not impossible to use at the table. Instead let's have some fun with probabilities to sharpen our thinking without having to become a PhD in statistics.

Some language and definition of terms:
Probability is the likelihood that an event will occur - a number between 0 \& 1 ( $0=$ impossibility \& $1=$ certainty $)$.
Probability = \# Win cases /Total (\# Win + \# Loss) cases
Risk is the potential of gaining or losing a thing of value. What's the best to minimize the risk my contract fails?

Odds reflect the payout necessary to bring a choice to even. Odds are the probability an event will occur divided by the probability that that event will not occur.

What goes into the calculation? We have a random event with a known number of outcomes. When it comes to bridge, the number of outcomes is known, but the possibilities are so many that we use probabilities to guide our bidding and play decisions. Absent information to the contrary, and assuming a truly random deal of the cards, we can calculate that the likelihood of suit distributions:

Calculating the frequency of these combination is eyerolling. What matters are some of the ideas we can cull from this table:
The most balanced shape 4333 is only $5^{\text {th }}$ most likely. 6430 is the most likely shape with a void and 5431 with a singleton.
7321 is more than 3.6 times as likely as 7222 .

From which we can see -

- The most common hand strength is 10 HCP (by a whisker over 9 ). Of course since there are only 40 HCP in a deck, and 4 players, the average HCP holding is 10.
- 7-12 HCP hands account for over half the hands we see (52.7\%).
- In a 26 board session it is very unlikely any one hand will hold over 24 HCP.
- An opening 1 N (12-14) will likely hold 12 or a poor 13.
- An opening 2 N (20-22) will likely have only 20 HCP .
- 0-5 HCP hands occur more frequently than 15-37 HCP hands ( $14 \%$ to $13.9 \%$ ).

## Concepts

When it comes to play one of the first lessons about probability is the finesse. Assume there is no additional information affection what we know about the distribution of the opponent's hands.

We can expand the list to discuss the chance one of two finesses in different suits will succeed (about 75\%).

Understanding the probabilities for cards missing from one of our longer fits (2 hands) helps us make good choices.

Where * indicates the SMALLER number of cards held by either opponent. \# Out is the number of missing cards held by opponents. The table values are in $\%$.

An odd number of missing cards are most likely to split evenly. An even number of cards will most likely split unevenly (except when 2 cards are missing!).

Another observation is for the rare case we are missing just two cards. In this case we can calculate the odds shown using the concept of VACANT SPACES. Assume we know nothing about the distribution. When we lead at trick 2 toward dummy's AQ in our 11 card trump holding, Left hand Opponent plays low. Do you finesse the missing $K$ or play for the drop?

Count the spaces left in each hand just before you make your play. Left Hand Opponent has 11 cards left, and Right Hand Opponent has 12 card left. That means at trick 2, Right Hand Opponent is $12 /(11+12)=12 / 23$ or 52.17 \% likely to hold the missing K. (If we wind back the play to before trick 1 , the calculation says LHO has 12 and RHO has 13 spaces for a 12/25 likelihood or exactly $52 \%$ ). We can use this information to create a success table that suggests the likelihood that a missing honor will drop:

H stands for an Honor like K, Q or J. We can use this table to define some very useful guidelines.

Let's rearrange what's in the table to express it in a more useful easy to read way:

How is this useful? Well, if a finesse is 50\%, then knowing when a drop is a better play might help find the line with lowest overall risk.

Why does that matter? This speaks directly to the concept of combining chances in the play of the hand.

To combine INDEPENDENT chances, we multiply the probabilities. Remember our fair coin? Well, what is the probability that if we flip the coin we get 4 heads in a row? Since the coin is fair and the flip is a random event we simply multiply as follows:

4 flips $=1 / 2 \times 1 / 2 \times 1 / 2 \times 1 / 2=1 / 16=6.25 \%$
When we multiply fractions less than 1 , we always get a smaller fraction.'

The same logic applies to finesses. Assuming randomly dealt hands with no additional information about distribution, 4 finesses would have the SAME poor probability of succeeding.

4 finesses $=1 / 2 \times 1 / 2 \times 1 / 2 \times 1 / 2=1 / 16=6.25 \%$
That argues against taking all possible finesses.

## The Whole Bridge Hand - Plan your campaign

1) Use ALL your information - Bidding \& Play
2) Start with a flexible picture of declarer/opponent
3) Count hand winners and losers ("off the top") and SLOW LOSERS
4) Count entries
5) Count stoppers in threat suits.
6) Count HCP - Your total and their total
7) Combine your chances - Source of Tricks/Trick Packets
8) Avoid the DANGER HAND. Assume perfect defense.
9) Modify plan as you learn - Show-outs are GOLD

Yes, this is a bit of work, but you did say you wanted to improve your game. Right? How to play suits - wrong when done alone - right when done in the context of whole hand. Know the \# tricks needed.

## KEY:

What Plan has the Best Chance? (make my contract). How do we combine chances???

The total chance cannot exceed 1 nor be less than zero.

1) Choose so that when chance fails, you are still ALIVE.
2) Your best first chance will maximize your success for all remaining chances.
3) Leave short suits until the end.
4) Cash winners in your long side suit (drop honors)
5) Finesse long suits into safe hands.
6) Avoid finesses completely if possible

Let's try a simple example. Your contract depends on a finesse in one suit or on a 3-3- break in a different suit. If the 3-3 break fails you are down immediately. If the finesse fails you can still try for the 3-3 break.

Without an example hand to look at, you can see that we should try the finesse first then if it fails, we should try the 3-3- break. But what is our likelihood of success?

Total $=p($ Win $)+P($ Loss $) \times(P$ option 2 win, etc. $)$
Here we have only 2 options. If the finesse wins, we make the contract. That's $50 \%$. If it doesn't win then we have the $3-3$ break. That probability is not $36 \%$, but $36 \%$ of the remaining $50 \%$ left by the failed finesse.

$$
P_{\text {success }}=50 \%+36 \%(50 \%)=68 \%
$$

The threat to making 4 4 is the slow loser in the suit! You cannot draw trumps (2 losers) - you lose the $\vee$ stopper race ( 2 stoppers - they started first). You must bank on the $\downarrow$ splitting 4-3 (87\%) and cash $3 \diamond$ tops for a $\vee$ discard. Now you can afford to lose 2 $\alpha$ and $1 \%$. Note - if they lead a $\downarrow$, draw trumps immediately. Your slow stopper will go away on the $3^{\text {rd }} \downarrow$, but there's no need to take the $13 \%$ risk of a bad split. Now you make if $\leqslant$ are 5-2!

## Example 2: Suit Split Decision

## AQ1076 Do you finesse for the J? <br> K3 Why/Not? (Answer 2)

## ANSWER 2

Absent additional information the finesse is worth $50 \%$. If we are looking for the $J$, then we can win when the $J$ is singleton, doubleton or Jxx in either hand. Combining those chances results in $2.4+16+36=54.4 \%$ so cashing tops is better.

## Example 3 - Suit Split Decision

AJ975
You play the K and LHO follows with the 2 RHO with the 3 . You play the 6 toward K1086 dummy and LHO plays the 4 . Finesse or drop?
(Answer 3)

## ANSWER 3

The Qxx w/ LHO is $6.21 \%$. The Qx with RHO is $6.78 \%$. The ratio $6.78 / 13=52.2 \%$. Any $2-2$ break is $40 \%$ while a $3-1$ break is $50 \%$. 2-2 has 12 cases. $3-1$ has only 8 . So the specific case for $3-1$ is more likely (absent additional information). Vacant spaces says LHO has 11 while RHO has 12 before declarer's choice. $12 / 23=52.2 \%$ the $Q$ is with RHO.

## Example 4 - Suit Split Decision

AQ97 You play the 10 to the Q and the 7 to the K, RHO K108 playing 2,4 and LHO playing 3, 5. Now you continue the 8 and LHO plays the 6 . Finesse or
drop?
(Ans 4)
ANSWER 4 You have seen 3 insignificant cards from LHO and 2 from RHO. That leaves 10 spaces for LHO and 11 for RHO. Therefore the probability that the J is with LHO is
$11 /(10+11)=52.4 \%$. DROP! (Taking more than 1 finesse REDUCES your chance of success in many cases).

ANSWER 5 - A finesse-aholic will look at this hand and see 3 finesses, draw trumps in 2-4 rounds and begin. 3 Finesses here are independent (different suits, different players) so the odds of all 3 are $1 / 2 \times 1 / 2 \times 1 / 2$ or $12.5 \%$. They need only 2 of the 3 finesses. How do you calculate the probability? Consider this "success table" for the possible outcomes:

| A | W | W | W | W | L | L | L | L |
| :--- | :--- | :--- | :--- | :--- | :--- | :--- | :--- | :--- |
| B | W | W | L | L | W | W | L | L |
| $\mathbf{C}$ | W | L | W | L | W | L | W | L |

The 3 different suits are A, B, and $C$. $W$ is a winning finesse, and $L$ is a losing finesse. The table shows all possible combinations of W's and L's. We can count 4 cases where there are 2 or more W's and 4 cases where there are fewer than 2 W 's. The probability that 2 of 3 independent finesses succeed is $50 \%$. (The calculation for three independent cases with one of 2 outcomes is $2^{n}$. Here $2^{3}=8$ total cases)

The intermediate player might realize that after pulling trumps if the finesse works and they split 3-3, they can pitch a losing on the long means:

Satisfied? Look deeper! Treat the hand as "one of 2 finesses": Finesse \&. If win, cash tops. If no Q , finesse $\uparrow$. If lose, long goes away on $3^{\text {rd }} \downarrow$. Likewise if finesse loses, we need only the finesse to win (Pitch the losing on the $)$ - a 75\% play.

## Steve's Tips:

1) Always choose the plan with the best probability
2) Find a good plan? LOOK AGAIN. FIND ANOTHER
3) When faced with equal choices, choose the option that allows you to STAY ALIVE longest (Take more chances)
4) Any Chance is better than NO Chance
5) NEVER take a PRACTICE FINESSE.

BONUS QUESTIONS - Use the IMP chart to estimate the probability for game and slam. (MP pairs depend on what pairs do - this is unpredictable and cannot be used to estimate game chances as each field is different (skill, people, aggressiveness, etc.). BREAKEVEN is the success probability that makes the expected gain equal to the expected loss - over a large number of contracts.

*If opponents bid game, then bidding a Grand Slam is Poor. With 12 tricks, a slam gains $+11 \mathrm{NV} \&+13 \mathrm{~V}$ IMPS, the grand loses -11 NV Imps and -13V, swinging -22NV \& -26V Imps. Avoid grand slams when they only bid game. Need 14 tricks.

Vulnerable games are worth extra and require less of a success chance to pay off. Nonvulnerable games actually a better chance to pay out. Small slams should be no worse than $50 \%$. Grand slams should be bid only when better than $50 \%$ ( $57 \%$ ) But if opponents only bid game, you risk losing more than you gain - a small slam would be a big enough gain.

BQ2: Contract 6a. Trumps are 2-2.
What are your chances? Which finesse do you take? Remember a practice finesse is a finesse that creates no tricks and only adds risk to your plan. Get this right and you are not a finesse-aholic.

ANSWER: NO FINESSE! Clear $\downarrow \&$. Play 3 rounds of from the top. $100 \% 12$ tricks. Check out why.

Bob Fisk $\underline{\mathbf{X}}$ This isn＇t for penalty－this simply says that you aren＇t willing to sell out to $2 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$ ．Partner
might hold something like xxx Jxx KQTxx Qx，and you＇re cold for three Hearts（opponents are making 2ム）．

Joe Muenks Pass Act or do not act over the double but do not get pushed to the 3 level with half the points and only 8 trump． $3>$ over double shows 6 hearts and a minimum； $3 \downarrow$ over $2 \wedge$ by partner shows 4 hearts and a minimum．Here play good defense and try for +50 which scores well compared to those with -100 in 3 ．

Steve Vogel Pass I have a minimum hand and my balanced distribution is less than ideal．Partner would likely have bid $3 \vee$ with 4 －card support，so I will follow the law of total tricks and pass．

Steve Moese Pass This tests your partnership discipline．What matters in a competitive auction for a partial is how many trumps we have，not how many HCP we have．We compete to the 3 －level when we have a 9 －card fit（and useful shortness in the short trump hand）．By passing $2 \wedge$ ，North says＂I don＇t have 4 trumps＂（or I have 4333 and too weak to compete）．


Bob Jones Pass You have a great hand for partner but bidding again is not justified．Pass

Bob Fisk Pass What else？Partner isn＇t bidding $5 \star$ to get your opinion on where to play the contract． If 5 goes down，and you were supposed to be in 3NT，guess whose fault it is？It＇s hard to construct a hand where $5 \star$ could be the right bid．Let me know if you come up with one．

Joe Muenks Pass Epls，I play jumps so many ways，but if partner fails to bid first，hearts is not trump．If partner bids 2 then any number of diamonds that is game forcing with diamonds（a good hand）．Here partner wishes to play 54 （ $\mathrm{xx}, \mathrm{x}$ ，

KQJxxxxxx, $x$ ) and you have enough cards it should be an easy make.

Steve Vogel 6NT Partner bid 5 knowing only that I had a 5-card heart suit and 7+ points. I expect partner to have a solid diamond suit (probably 9 of them) and likely nothing else. My holdings in the other suits should provide enough to come to 12 tricks in notrump. Could partner have long diamonds without the Ace? I suppose so, but you live only once.

Steve Moese Pass Partner has alternatives to show us a hand that is strong and that might support a slam opposite an average opening bid. They did not choose those approaches. (All would start with a simple cuebid, or, if your methods require, a GF Jump Shift in diamonds (Some require the cuebid to show a fit with overcaller's suit).

WARNING - Some might think that 5 could be exclusion Key Card Blackwood - That is remotely possible (I would not use it after a simple overcall), but requires agreements not in evidence for this problem. Also holding a singleton diamond with neither opponent mentioning diamonds, partner cannot possibly hold a void in diamonds (what Exclusion Keycard shows).

Bob Jones 2ヶ When you have heart support, you should not bid 1 unless you are good enough to jump to $3 \vee$ at your next turn. Is this hand good enough? We don't think so. Bid $2 \downarrow$.

Bob Fisk 1p Unless you play Flannery, partner could easily hold QJxx AQxxx J QTx, and a Spade contract will play better than a Heart contract. If partner doesn't have four Spades, you'll simply bid Hearts at the appropriate level when it gets back to you.

Joe Muenks 1NT Playing $2 / 1$, our goal is to find an 8 card major so we run through a forcing NT to show a 3 card limit raise in hearts since we found one. Playing standard, we bid 1 a then jump in hearts to show the 3 card limit raise.

Steve Vogel 2v I have 10 hcp , but my hand is aceless, I have no ruffing value and my spots are poor. I will downgrade the hand to a constructive raise, but I will accept any game try partner may make.

## Steve Moese 2V Yes, we have 10 HCP .

However we also have 9-9.5 losers - not the shape for an Invitational Heart raise with 3 trumps. I do not bid spades on 4 when I want to make only a mixed raise. I require 5 spades or a better hand ( 8 losers). So I settle for a rich $2 \vee$ and plan to accept any game try that makes sense.


Bob Jones 2NT $2 \boldsymbol{v}$ would be fourth suit forcing - an artificial game force not even promising hearts. Choose between 2 $\downarrow$, $\downarrow$, and 2NT. We prefer 2NT.

Bob Fisk N/A I bid 2aver 1 m with this hand to show exactly five Spades, four Hearts, and invitational values. Perfect! Without that gadget, this hand is hard to bid.

Joe Muenks 2NT This is close to warranting a try with $2 \downarrow$ (game forcing), but when the hands are a mismatch, stay low, so even with my good 5 card suit and 10 prime points, I'll just invite with 2 NT . If partner has 14 or more, or a good 13 , they can bid $3 \varphi$ [with 4], 3 [with 3] or 3NT [1-2 spades and 1-3 hearts] to show their hand.

Steve Vogel 2NT I cannot bid $2 \boldsymbol{\text { ® }}$, as that would be 4th suit forcing to game. My choices are 2NT, 3 or $2 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$, which I would rank in that order. I believe 2 NT
best describes the value of my hand．If my spades were A10xxx and my diamonds were Kxx，I would choose 3 instead．

Steve Moese 2NT The value bid．Yes，I have 4 hearts，but I cannot rebid them here because hearts is the fourth suit and a $2 \checkmark$ bid would be game forcing． 2 NT says I have invitational values and stoppers in the majors（in context of this auction）．If partner has 4 hearts，they can bid $3 \checkmark$ if they are willing to accept my invitation．While I am unbalanced，I reserve the jump to 3 for hands that hold 4 diamond cards and cannot stop hearts．
Theme－when partner bids a new suit after an invitational bid，we are forced to game．
Second theme－When partner opens a minor suit， hands that hold 5 spades and 4 or 5 hearts can be difficult to bid．There is an expert treatment that solves the rebid issues well：
UMJOODO（aka Reverse Flannery or YrennelaF） stands for Unusual Major Jumps Over One Diamond （Minor）Opening．The original mnemonic was derived from its use in Precision．（There the 1s opening is reserved for strong hands so many hands $2 / 1$ or Standard players open 1＊are opened $1 *$ instead）．For details see：

If you adopt Reverse Flannery，be sure to discuss what 1m－14－1NT－20 means－not trivial．


## Bob Jones 3Y

This hand will be a powerful dummy for hearts．Bid $3 \vee$ ．

Bob Fisk 2ヶ Partner＇s $2 \star$ bid is forcing for one round，and often artificial although we rarely alert it． If partner wasn＇t looking for 3－card Heart support， they＇ll clarify that with their next bid，and you＇ll end up in 3 NT ．

Joe Muenks $\underline{3 \boldsymbol{Y}}$ We open a suit and rebid it with 6 and a minimum or stretch hand，so our has
hidden a lot of our actual playing strength．Whether playing $2 \star$ natural or artificial（NMF），partner shows $5 \vee$ ．The jump to $3 \vee$ is game forcing but reserves room for your unlimited strength partner to cue spades and hear of your diamond control，which might be just what she needs for slam．

Steve Vogel 2ヶ Partner＇s bid is New Minor Forcing for one round，and my first obligation is show 3－card support for his／her major suit．My hand is not strong enough for a splinter bid in diamonds（4ヶ）．

Steve Moese 3v Our hand has gone up in value after partner＇s 2 bid．We have 3 cover cards，and a useful void．We fully expect partner to have at least 5 hearts．Let partner know about our interest in a heart game．（Since we never rebid $2 \leqslant$ when holding 4 Hearts in this auction，partner cannot be misled by our jump raise）．

When partner is unlimited（as here）it＇s usually good to avoid jumping directly to game－partner might have interest in slam．Jumping might shut down important exploration，rendering slam a guess at best．
